Citywide Results of Community Engagement

THE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

As part of the community engagement process, the City of Fresno disseminated an online and paper survey asking residents to identify their highest perceived needs in housing, public facilities, infrastructure, service, and economic development. Respondents were asked to categorize each eligible funding activity as "in high need of improvement", "in moderate need of improvement", or in "low-need of improvement". In total, 417 residents responded to the survey, 345 in English and 72 in Spanish. To analyze the results, "high need for improvement" was given three points, "moderate" two points, and "low" one point. The categories were then compared based upon their average point score (three being the highest and 1 being the lowest). For a detailed chart with scores by category and zip code, see Table A-E.

The results of the survey were supplemented by feedback provided by residents at four in-person meetings, which were conducted in each of the four target areas of the city (North, Central, Southeast and Southwest Fresno). At the meetings, participants were asked to use to vote on their two highest priorities for each funding category. Survey analysts then aggregated the total number of votes for each meeting and ranked the priorities by total votes. A total of 111 people attended the community meetings, and approximately 95% participated in the voting exercise.

OVERALL RESULTS OF THE COMMUNITY NEEDS SURVEY

The overall highest needs indicated by survey participants were jobs (average score 2.45 out of 3) and improving public facilities (2.36), followed closely by developing more affordable housing (2.35). Within the housing subcategory, the highest need was code enforcement (average score 2.3), followed by energy efficiency (2.2), and permanent housing for the homeless (2.18). Survey respondents indicated that parks are by far the highest priority for public facilities (2.24), followed by educational facilities (2.17), then youth centers (2.13). For infrastructure, respondents prioritized street improvements, lighting improvements, and renovated playgrounds (2.20, 2.20, and 2.15 respectively), and in the service category, neighborhood clean up, employment, transportation, and homeless services received the highest number of votes (2.08, 2.07, 2.07, and 2.07). Finally under the category of economic development, residents prioritized employment training and financial assistance for the creation and expansion of small businesses as the three most pressing needs (2.08, 2.04, and 2.01 respectively).

OVERALL RESULTS OF THE IN-PERSON MEETINGS

The results of the in-person voting exercise indicate that for housing, the greatest need is for affordable rental housing (52 votes), followed by code enforcement (28 votes) and housing for the homeless (25 votes). For services, the highest needs are transportation (36 votes), crime prevention (31 votes), and youth services (27 votes). In the public facilities category, parks ranked highest (56 votes), followed by youth centers (38 votes), and homeless shelters (23 votes). For infrastructure, street improvements (52 votes), playgrounds (47 votes) and abatement of vacant lots (42 votes) all scored highest. Finally for economic development, participants felt that job training was the most important (78 votes) followed by financial support for small business expansion (47 votes). For a complete list of votes by category see Table F.

IDENTIFYING NEEDS BY NEIGHBORHOOD

Although most respondents indicated that they live in eligible zip codes, approximately 71 survey respondents (17%) live in areas that exceeded the income limits of the block grant program. As shown in Table A-F, residents in non-eligible areas tend to rank all community and housing investments lower than residents living in higher poverty zip codes. In order to ensure that the survey results reflect the priorities of eligible neighborhoods and lower-income residents, survey analysts separated the survey results by eligible zip code and city subregion (see pages 7-13).



Survey Responses by Zip Code:

As shown in the map below, a higher proportion of survey respondents indicated that they lived in a zip code located in Southwest or Southeast Fresno - particularly 93706 and 93727. Seventy one (71) of the 416 responses live in a zip code that exceeds the income eligibility of the block grant programs. An additional 229 respondents did not respond to the question. Priorities for Southwest Fresno

Residents in Southwest Fresno (zip codes 93728, 93706, 93701, and 93721) expressed a high need for nearly all possible neighborhood investments and services (see scores in Appendix A-E). However, the following list provides a more thorough explanation of the top priorities from the survey and in-person discussion:

HOUSING:

According to the survey and the feedback from the Southwest Fresno Community meeting, the greatest housing needs in the area include: code enforcement, housing rehabilitation for homeowners, downpayment assistance, and rental assistance. Residents also expressed a desire for more affordable housing but were adamant that they did not want the City and County to concentrate all low-income housing developments in Southwest Fresno. Instead, residents said they want more mixed-income housing, opportunities for homeownership, and better housing rehabilitation programs in Southwest Fresno. Participants at the in-person meeting also expressed a desire to implement a rent-to-own program in the neighborhood.

PUBLIC FACILITIES:

Residents in West Fresno ranked parks and youth centers as their top priorities for public facilities. Childcare and health care facilities also ranked highly and many residents expressed a desire for multiuse facilities that could serve the needs of youth, children, and seniors at one central location. Residents also said they wanted more amenities and services at the parks, especially in Hyde Park which currently has no playground equipment.

INFRASTRUCTURE & NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS:

Lighting, sidewalks and street improvements were the highest priority for most Southwest Fresno residents. Residents at the inperson meeting said many of the streets in the area have pot holes and the sidewalks are unsafe, particularly for children walking to school. Other high-ranking priorities included: clearance of vacant lots, building new playgrounds, and improved landscaping and tree planting.

SERVICES:

Improving health services, especially mental health services, and enhancing transportation service were among the highest priorities for both in-person participants and survey respondents. At the community meeting, participants stressed the importance of reliable transit for employment and expressed a desire to see more diverse transit options including improved bike lanes and pedestrian infrastructure.

In person meeting attendees also prioritized crime prevention, but in the discussion said that crime prevention should include youth services and mentoring programs. Other priorities from both the survey and in-person activity include: neighborhood clean-ups, landlord-tenant counseling, housing counseling, childcare and youth services.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

Southwest Fresno prioritized employment services, workforce development, and support for small businesses as the most pressing economic development needs. At the in-person meeting, one group said the City should create a more integrated anti-poverty strategy that prioritizes job creation and provides incentives for businesses. Both in-person attendees and survey respondents also indicated a need for facade improvements and more investment in commercial properties to attract grocery and retail outlets.



Priorities for Southeast Fresno

For the purposes of this report, Southeast Fresno includes the zip codes 93703, 93702, 93725, and 93727. Although residents in this neighborhood expressed a high need for nearly all services and investment, the following received the highest number of votes in both the survey and the in-person activity:

HOUSING

Participants at the in-person meeting in Southeast Fresno expressed a desire for more affordable housing, rental rehabilitation, and housing for the homeless. Survey respondents, on the other hand, voted for down-payment assistance and energy efficiency as their highest needs. Both in-person attendees and survey respondents listed code enforcement as among their top housing priorities and several residents said they were worried about lead paint and mold exposure. Sal Quintero, a City Council member in District 5 (Southeast Fresno), reported that many low-income homeowners and seniors have also asked for home repair and paint programs.

PUBLIC FACULTIES

Facilities for youth and children including parks, educational facilities, and youth centers, scored the highest at the in-person meeting and in the survey. In-person attendees said that many of the parks in their neighborhoods are unsafe and attract drug use, homeless people, and prostitution. Residents also expressed a desire for good quality health services that are accessible by transit and able to serve undocumented people. In-person attendees shared personal stories of family members struggling with mental illness and drug use, and said there is a need for more places to provide mental health services, especially for youth.

INFRASTRUCTURE & NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS

In the survey and the in-person activity, Southeast residents indicated that playgrounds, lighting and sidewalks had the highest need for improvement. At the in-person meeting, residents expressed a desire for the abatement of blighted and vacant homes, which they said attract crime and have been catching on fire. Councilmember Quintero said many of his constituents have expressed a need for curb and sidewalk installation in annexed neighborhoods. He also said residents have voiced concern over the removal of telephone/PG&E poles and underground utilities.

SERVICES

Southeast Fresno ranked transportation as one of the highest priority community needs. In-person meeting attendees said that transportation for seniors is of particular concern. Interestingly, crime prevention did not score well in the survey, but received the top votes in the in-person meeting. In-person attendees also expressed a need for more health and legal services for undocumented people.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Employment services and support for small businesses ranked highest both in the online survey and the in-person meeting activity. In-person attendees said workforce development is of particular concern. The survey responses from the zip code 93725 also prioritized public improvements to commercial/industrial sites as one of their top priorities.



Priorities for Central Fresno

For the purposes of this report, Central Fresno includes zip codes 93705, 93704, 93722, and 93726. Through the Community Needs Survey and the in-person discussions and activities, residents expressed the following needs and concerns:

HOUSING:

Code Enforcement was identified as a top need in both the survey and the in-person group discussion. Participants at the community meeting, however, expressed a desire to fund code enforcement through a fee structure rather than just from CDBG funds. Participants said that if code enforcement became more cost-neutral for the city, the block grant funds could be utilized to build more affordable housing and housing for the homeless. Survey respondents and in-person attendees also identified energy and water efficiencies as another top need.

FACILITIES:

Residents expressed the highest priority for improved parks, youth centers, and educational facilities. During the in-person discussion, participant said they would like to see more integrated community spaces that can be used for seniors, youth, and childcare. They also said they would like to see greater options for recreation and that parks should include critical amenities like bathrooms and not be located near freeways. In addition to recreational spaces, both survey respondents and in-person attendees voiced a critical need for homeless services.

INFRASTRUCTURE & NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS:

Survey respondents and in-person attendees said that street improvements are a critical need. They said street improvements should include active transportation infrastructure such as bicycle lanes and sidewalks. They also expressed a need for more lighting to improve safety and walkability. Residents also expressed a desire to transform vacant lots into community gardens/parks, improve recycled water systems to help with the drought, and build more playgrounds.

PUBLIC SERVICES:

Both survey respondents and in-person attendees identified transportation as the top public service need and said the local bus system needs extended hours and expanded areas. Neighborhood cleanups, health services, and services for the homeless were also ranked as top priorities. At the in-person meeting, participants said that there is a need for more legal services for tenants and better community-based policing activities. They also explained that the existing senior services are insufficient and more should be done to integrate youth and senior services.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Like every other area of the city, Central Fresno stressed the need for employment services and said the city should invest in programs to support lower-income young people in entering science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) careers. They also wanted to see more financial support for small businesses, including loans for small business creation and/or expansion.



Priorities for North Fresno

The only zip code in North Fresno that is eligible for CDBG funds is 93710, which is home to the El Dorado Park Neighborhood near Fresno State University. At the in-person meeting and through the community needs survey, residents of North Fresno expressed the following needs and concerns:

HOUSING

At the community meeting in North Fresno, participants expressed the need for code enforcement and rental rehabilitation, but emphasized that landlords should be held accountable to maintain their properties. Participants repeatedly discussed J.D. Homes, a large property management company in the area that according to residents, maintains its properties in substandard conditions. Code enforcement was also a top priority for survey respondents who live in this zip code.

Participants said that homelessness and housing insecurity is a significant problem in the city, and that permanent rental housing, homeless shelters, and emergency rental assistance are all important priorities.

Some participants at the in-person meeting also expressed the need for energy efficiency. They said PG&E bills are increasing by 5% per year and city investment in solar panels and shade trees could reduce energy costs for low-income residents. Survey respondents also agreed that energy efficiency and permanent housing for the homeless were top issues and voted most for these two topics. Since El Dorado Park is mostly rental housing, several groups said investing in homeownership opportunities is important to diversify the housing stock.

PUBLIC FACILITIES

Participants voiced the greatest need for increased parks and recreation service. They said that the Boys and Girls club is heavily used, but closed on weekends. They also said partnering with Fresno Unified to make the school grounds open to the public would help with park access. Like the in-person attendees, survey respondents also prioritized the needs of children and youth and ranked parks and recreation, facilities for abandoned children, and educational facilities as the highest needs.

INFRASTRUCTURE & NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS

Both survey respondents and in-person participants expressed a need for street improvements, more lighting, and playgrounds. At the community meeting, participants also expressed a desire to convert vacant lots into parks and other community spaces.

SERVICES

Transportation was another top concern for both the survey respondents and those who attended the in-person meeting. Respondents expressed a need for more regular service, especially for the Barstow line. Other identified needs included: culturally-sensitive services for seniors and youth, crime prevention, and accessible physical and mental health services.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

In person participants said that there is a need for a "job creation" category and that employment training is critical. They also said supporting small businesses, limiting liquor stores, developing mixed-use housing, and supporting internship programs are also important economic development strategies.

- Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG)




Why is this Important to You?
