
Property and Business Improvement District (PBID) is a common and important tool for down town of the California cities with the loss of Redevelopment. Through a PBID, property owners pool their resources, talents, and energy to address the unique needs of a defined area.

Approximately 200 PBIDs exist in California, many of them in downtown areas. PBIDs are found in all of the state's largest urban areas, including the downtowns of comparably sized cities such as Sacramento, San Jose, Stockton, and Long Beach. PBIDs have also been an important component of revitalization in downtowns as nearby as Visalia and Tulare.

Our services have been aimed at improving the overall vitality of downtown, increasing property values, business recruitment, and creating positive perceptions through events and programs. We also provide clean and safe initiatives above and beyond City services.




