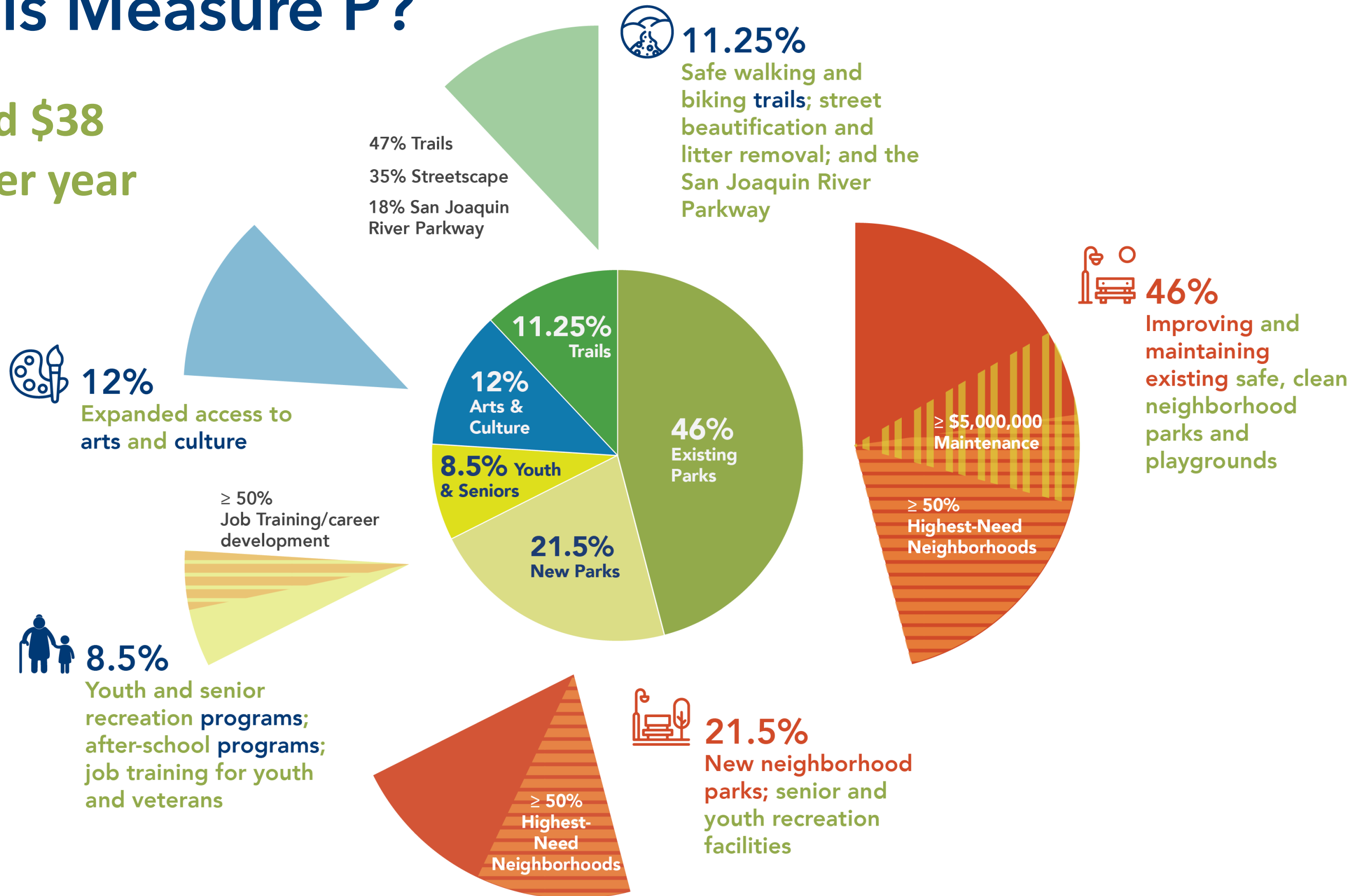
What is Measure P?

Fresno Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks Transactions and Use Tax (Article 15 of the Municipal Code)

- Implements voter-approved Measure P
- Establishes 3/8-cent sales tax to be used for:
 - (1) Improving and Maintaining** Clean and Safe Neighborhood **Parks**;
 - (2) New** Neighborhood **Parks**; Senior and Youth recreation **Facilities**
 - (3) Youth and Senior Recreation Programs**; After-School Programs; Job Training for Youth and Veterans
 - (4) Expanded Access to Arts and Culture**
 - (5) Safe Walking and Biking Trails; Street Beautification** and Litter Removal; **San Joaquin River Parkway**

Defining Highest-Need Neighborhoods

Measure P Requirements: Current Definition

Sec. 7-1508 (e) Identification of Highest-needs neighborhoods

(1) Up to and including **December 31, 2021**, the City, in conjunction with the Commission, shall define the highest-need neighborhoods as:

- those areas that are located within census tracts that rank within the top twenty-five percent (25%) of Fresno census tracts as identified in the State's CalEnviroScreen 3.0;
- and whose nearest park is identified as being in poor condition, according to the Plan, or is located within a priority zone for new parks, as defined by the Plan.

Defining Highest-Need Neighborhoods

Measure P Requirements: New Definition

Sec. 7-1508 (e) Identification of Highest-needs neighborhoods

(2) No later than **January 1, 2022**, the City, in conjunction with the Commission, shall adopt a new definition of highest-needs neighborhoods, after conducting a public process, to be updated every three years and included in subsequent updates to the Plan. The City and Commission shall create **a weighted index** incorporating the following data in developing the definition:

- (A) Existing conditions of parks and facilities based on needs assessment data in the Plan;
- (B) The proportion of the population that lives within walking distance (1/2 mile) to a park;
- (C) Park acreage per 1,000 residents;
- (D) Population density;
- (E) Neighborhood youth and senior population;
- (F) Neighborhood safety;
- (G) Neighborhoods of concentrated poverty;
- (H) Pollution burden, as defined by CalEnviroScreens 3.0, or subsequent updates;
- (I) Pre-term birth rates;
- (J) Years of potential life lost;
- (K) Neighborhood composite mortality rate.

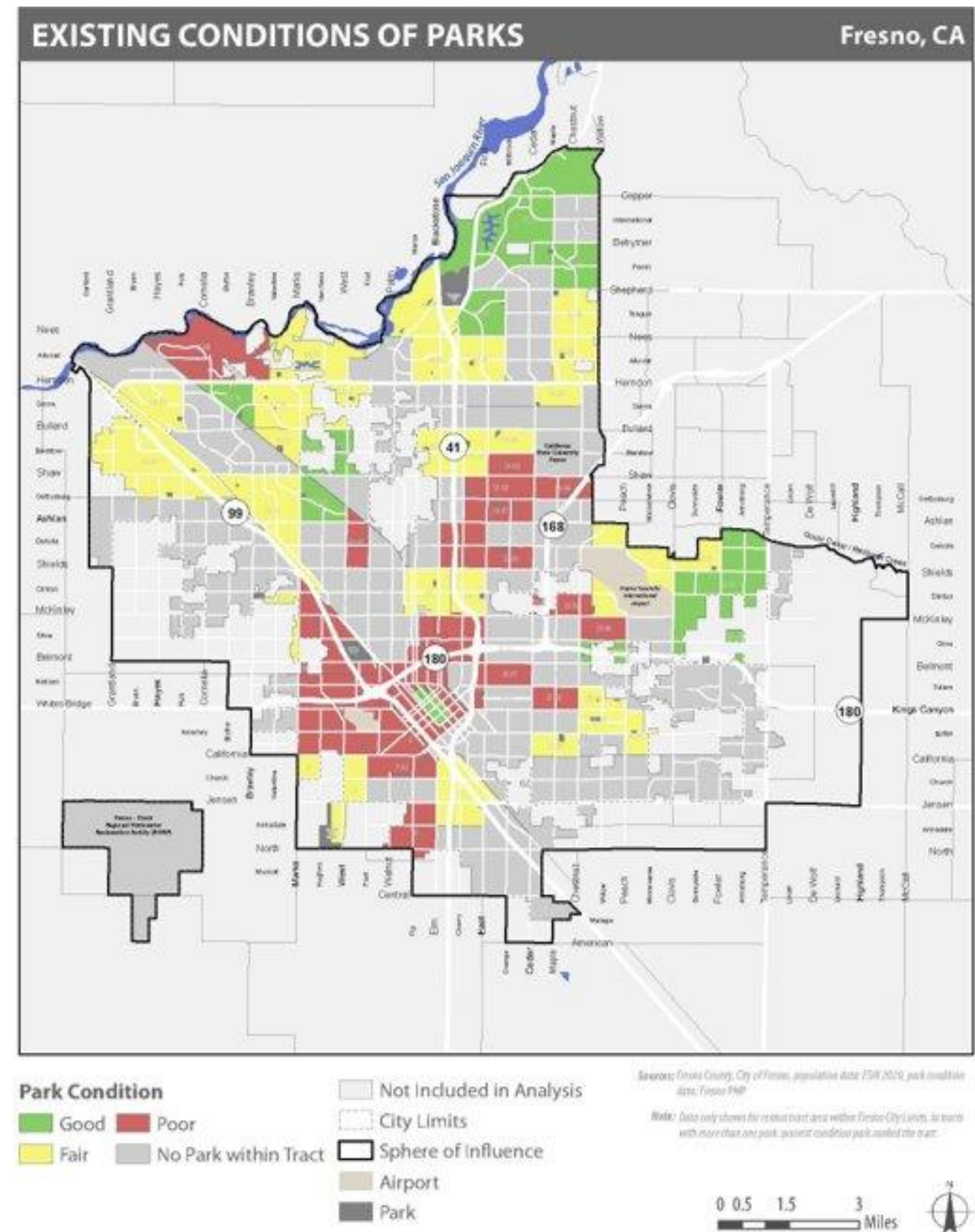
Equity Factors

(A) Existing Conditions of Parks and Facilities based on needs assessment data in the Master Plan

- Parks in Fresno are not all in the same condition.
- The red areas on this map highlight areas where parks exist, but are in poor condition.

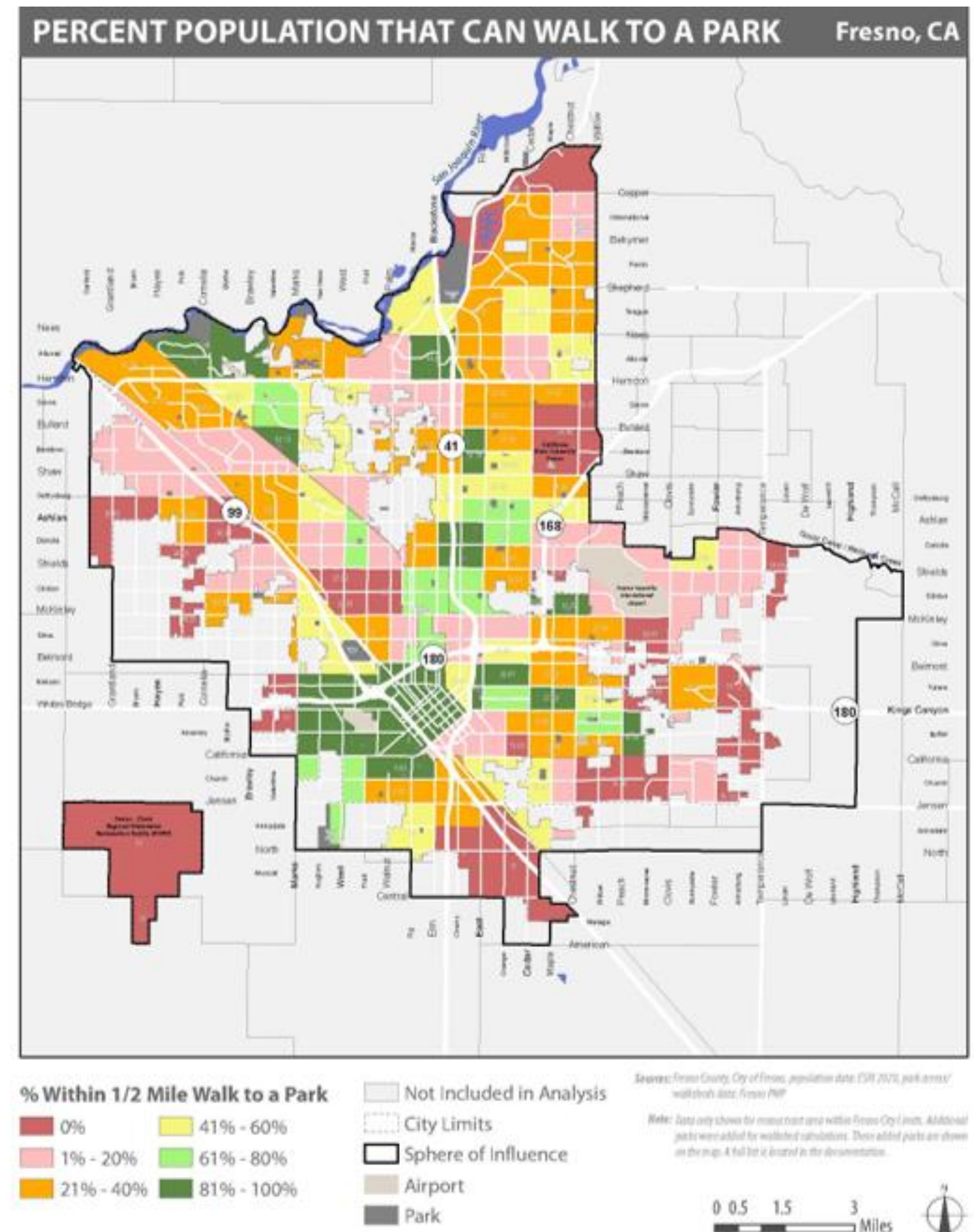
Equity Factors

(B) The Proportion of the Population That Lives within Walking Distance (1/2 Mile) to a Park

- Not all Fresno community members have easy access to nearby parks.
- Red on this map highlights areas where no one is within a 1/2-mile walk to a park.
- In pink and orange areas, most people are not within a 1/2-mile walk to a park.

Census Tracts where **20% or fewer** people live within 1/2 mile walking distance of a park



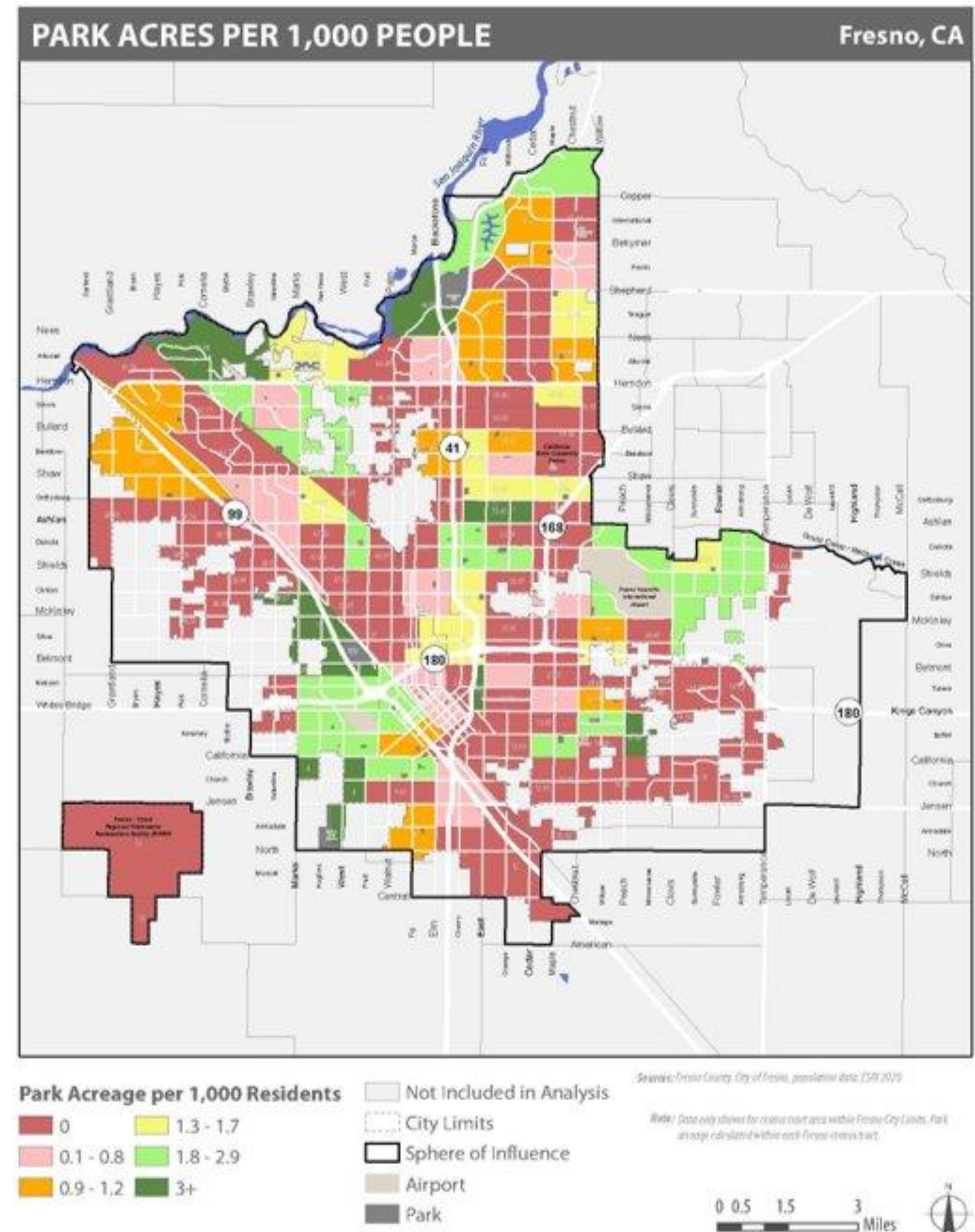
Equity Factors

(C) Park Acreage per 1,000 Residents

- Parks in Fresno are not evenly distributed throughout the city.
- The red on this map shows areas where there are no parks at all.
- Dark green areas are the only parts of Fresno with over 3 acres of park land per 1,000 residents.

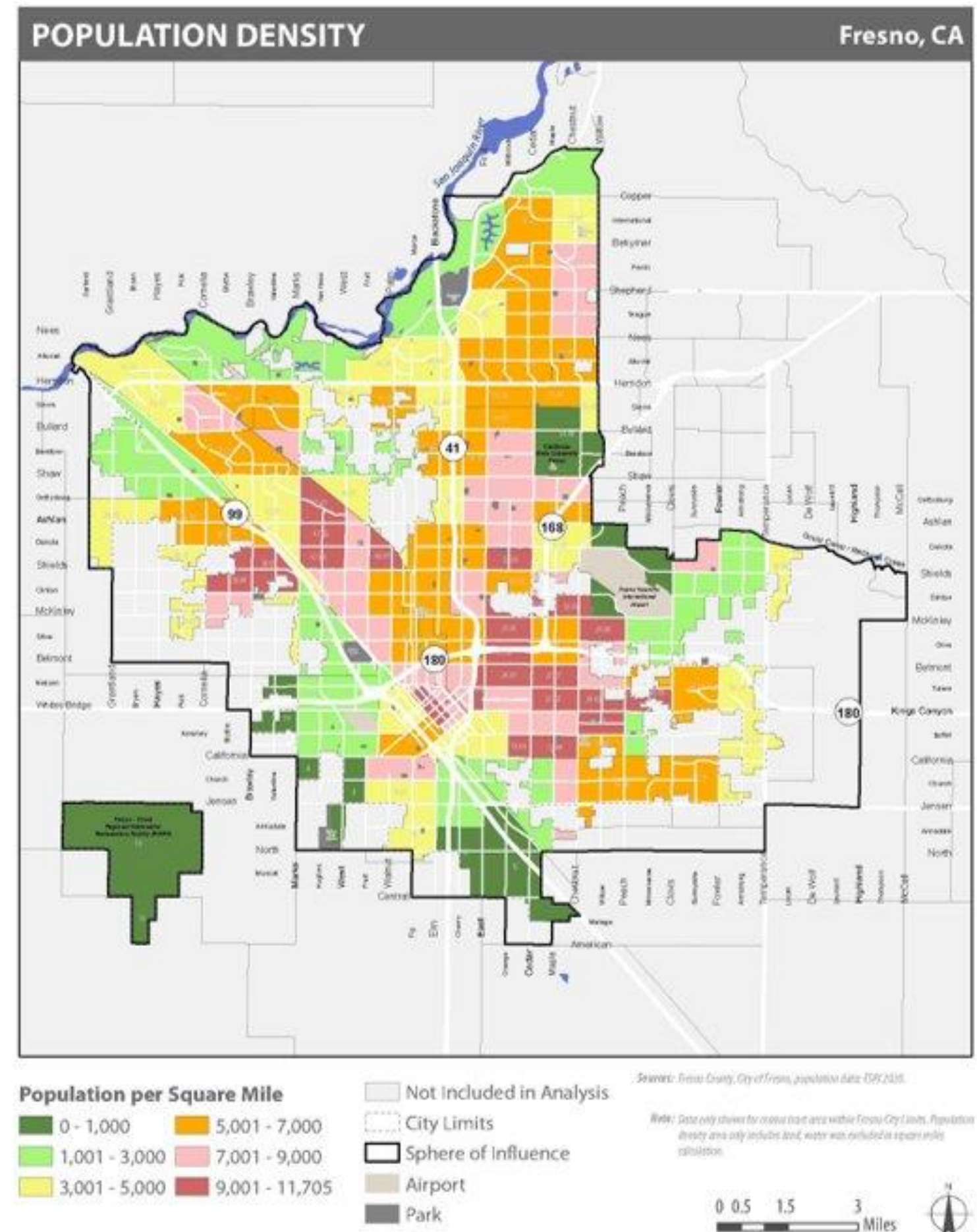
Equity Factors

(D) Population Density

- Denser residential areas of a city often have less access to private outdoor space. Public park access is even more critical here.
- The red and pink on this map shows where more people live.

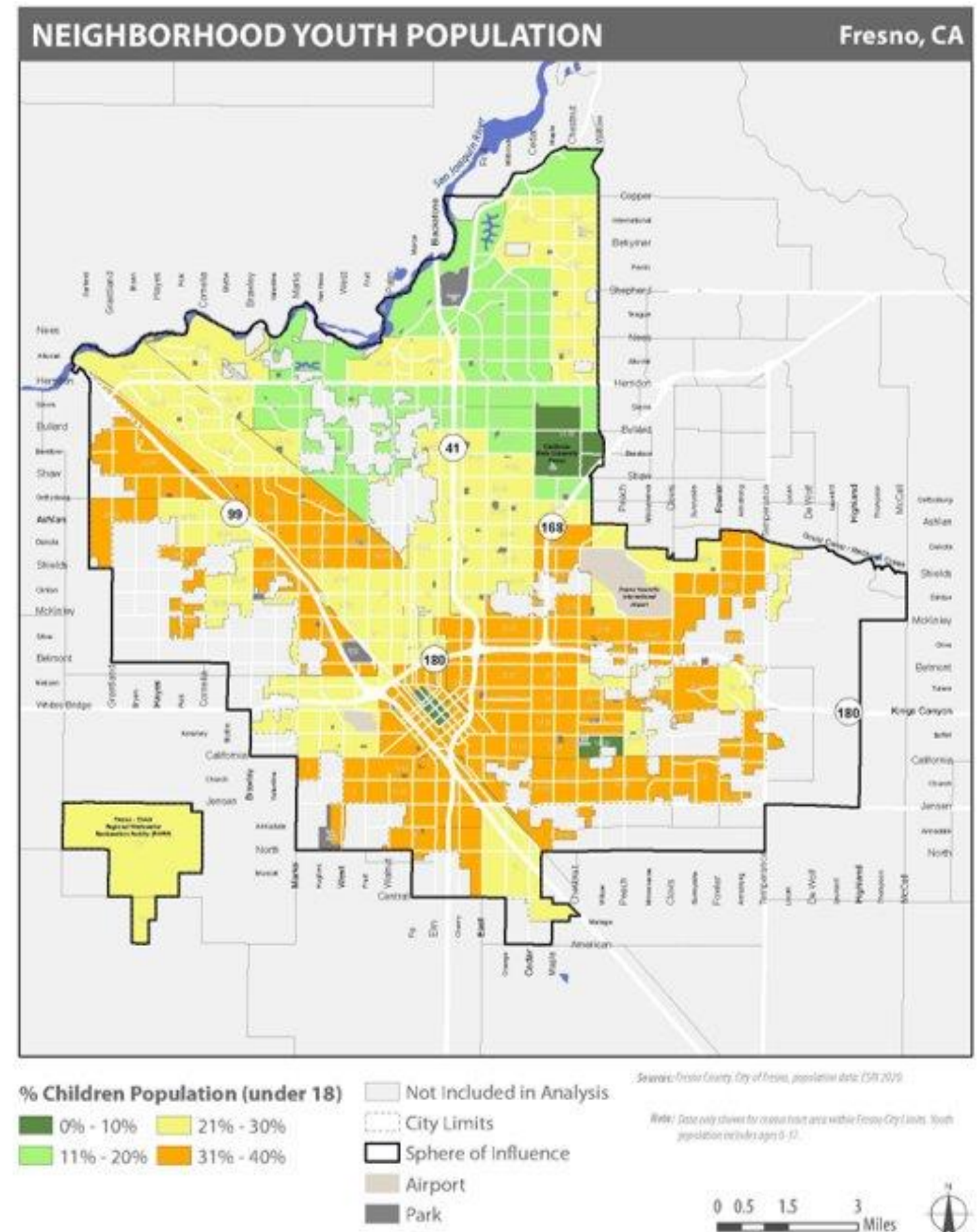
(E) Neighborhood Youth and Senior Population

- YOUTH

- Access to green space is important to the mental well-being, overall health and cognitive development of children.
- Orange areas on this map shows where there are more children under 18.

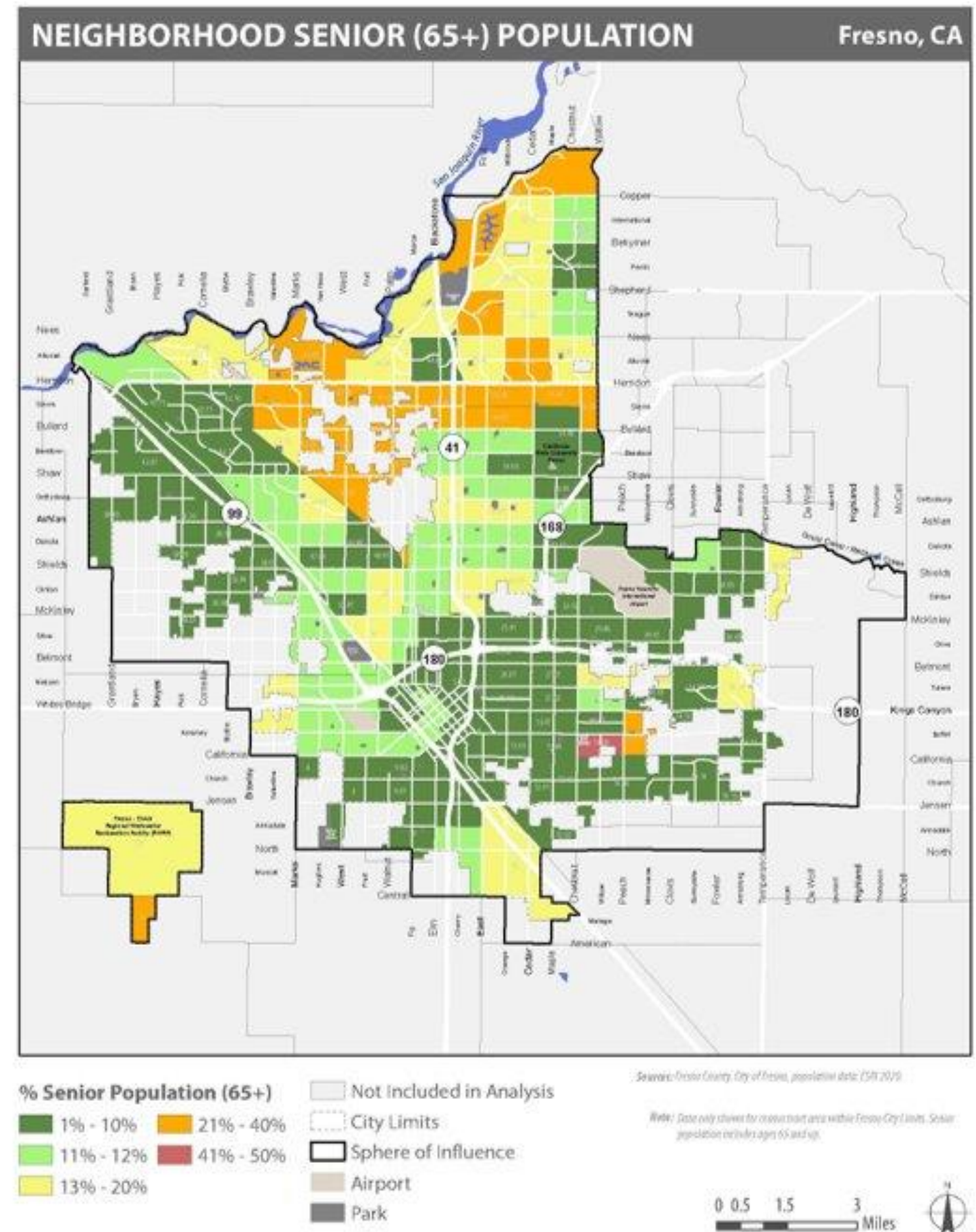
(E) Neighborhood Youth and Senior Population

- SENIORS

- Access to green space is important to the mental well-being and overall health for seniors as they age in place.
- Orange and red areas on this map shows where there are more adults age 65 or older.

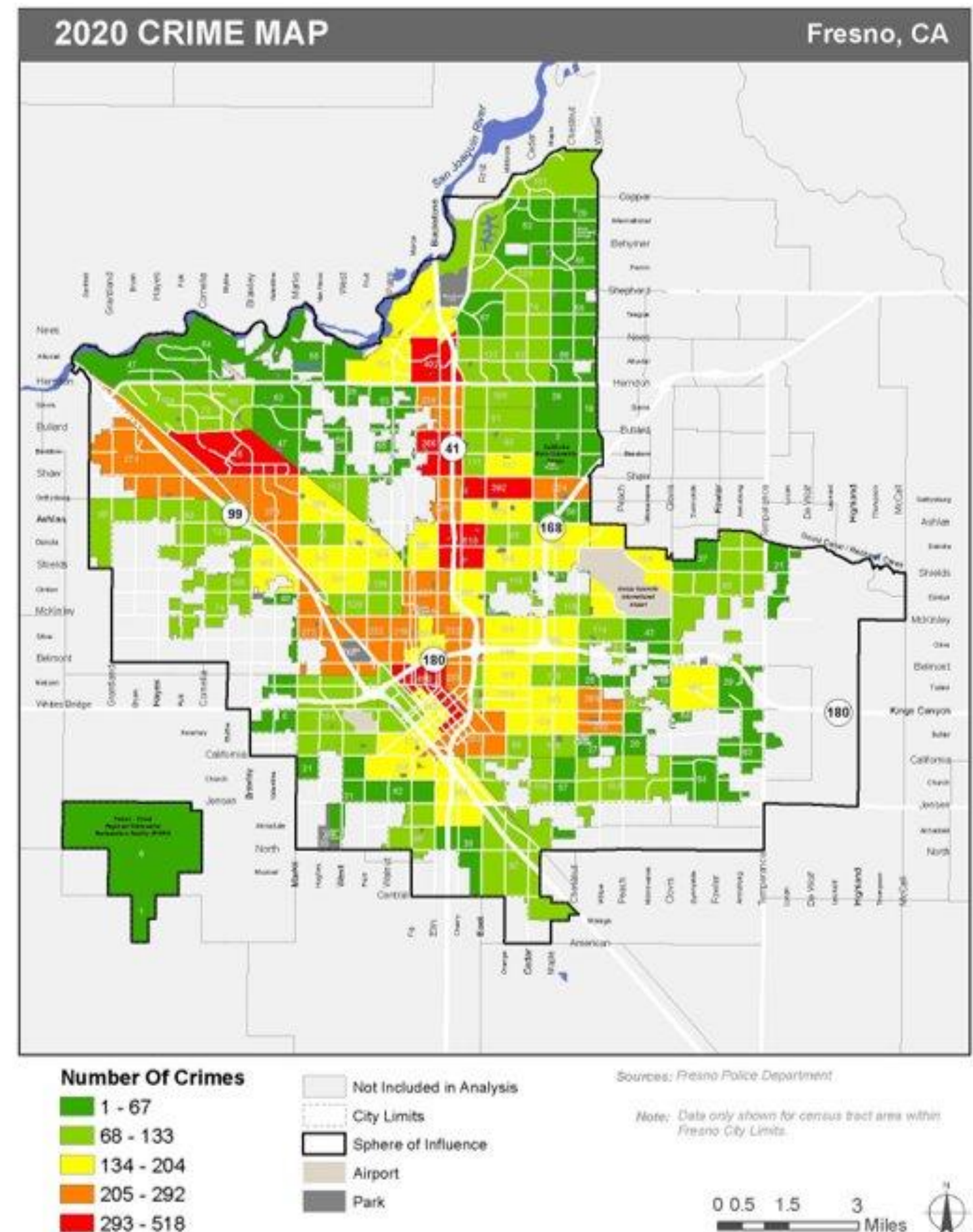
Equity Factors

(F) Neighborhood Safety

- Neighborhoods with a higher investment in public green space and activation tend to see more community cohesion.
- Red and orange on this map show areas in Fresno where there were a higher number of crimes reported in 2020.

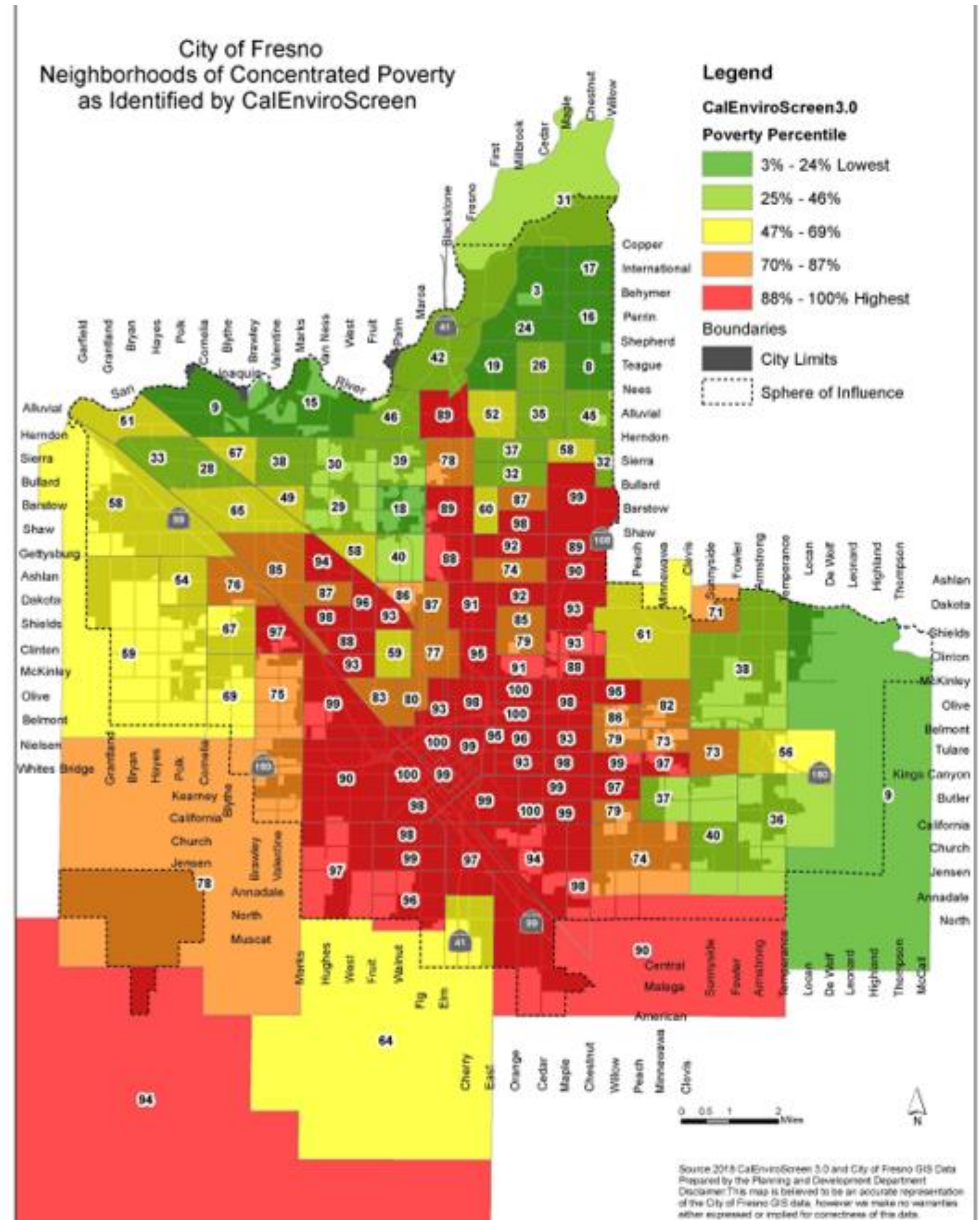
(G) Neighborhoods of Concentrated Poverty

- People with lower economic independence rely on public parks to fulfill their public health needs.
- Red on this map shows areas of concentrated poverty.

Poverty is defined as Percent of the population living below two times the federal poverty level (5-year estimate, 2011-2015).

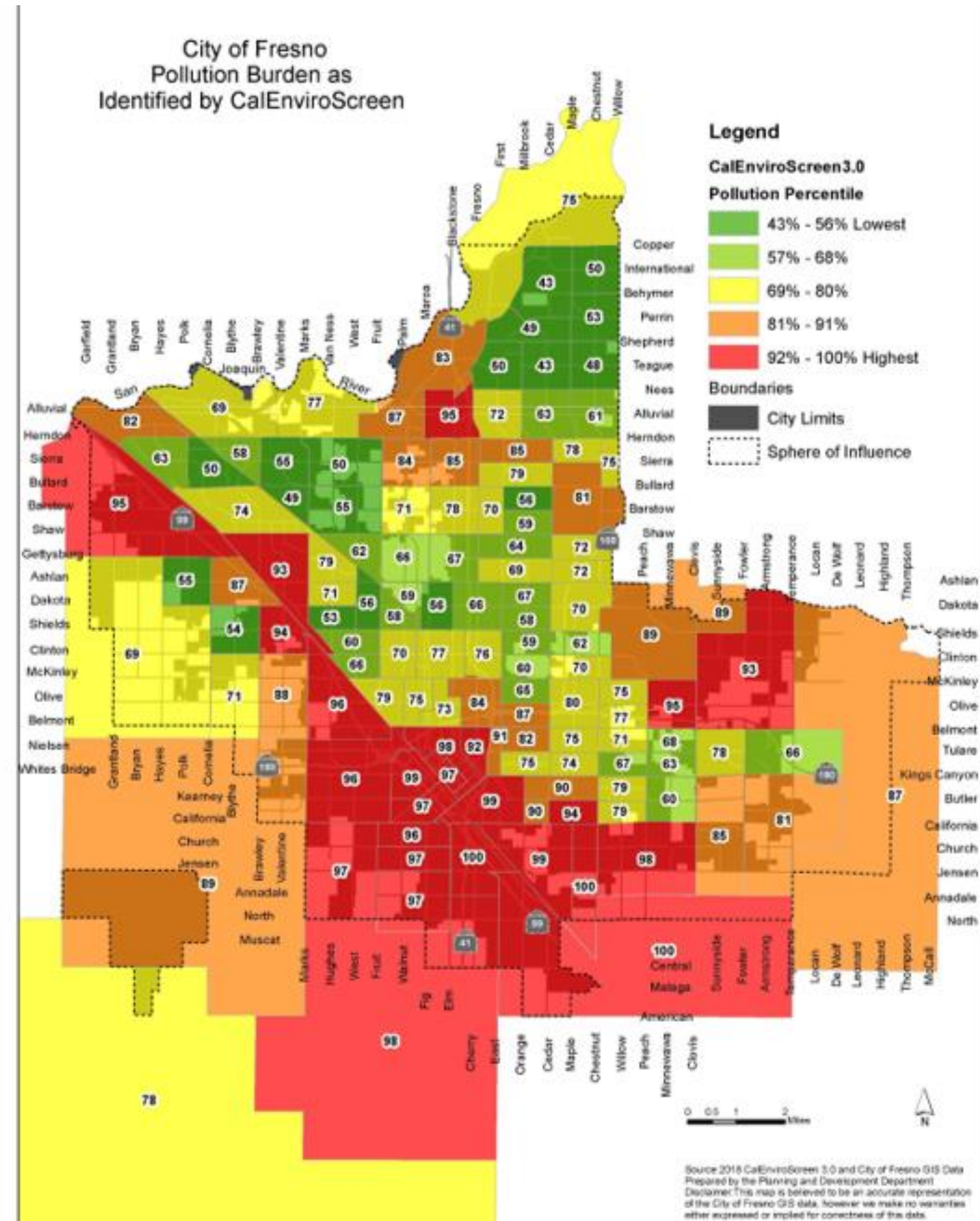
- Urban green spaces have a natural ability to filter pollution from the air and reduce local air and ground temperature.
- Red on this map shows areas of Fresno that have a higher pollution burden.

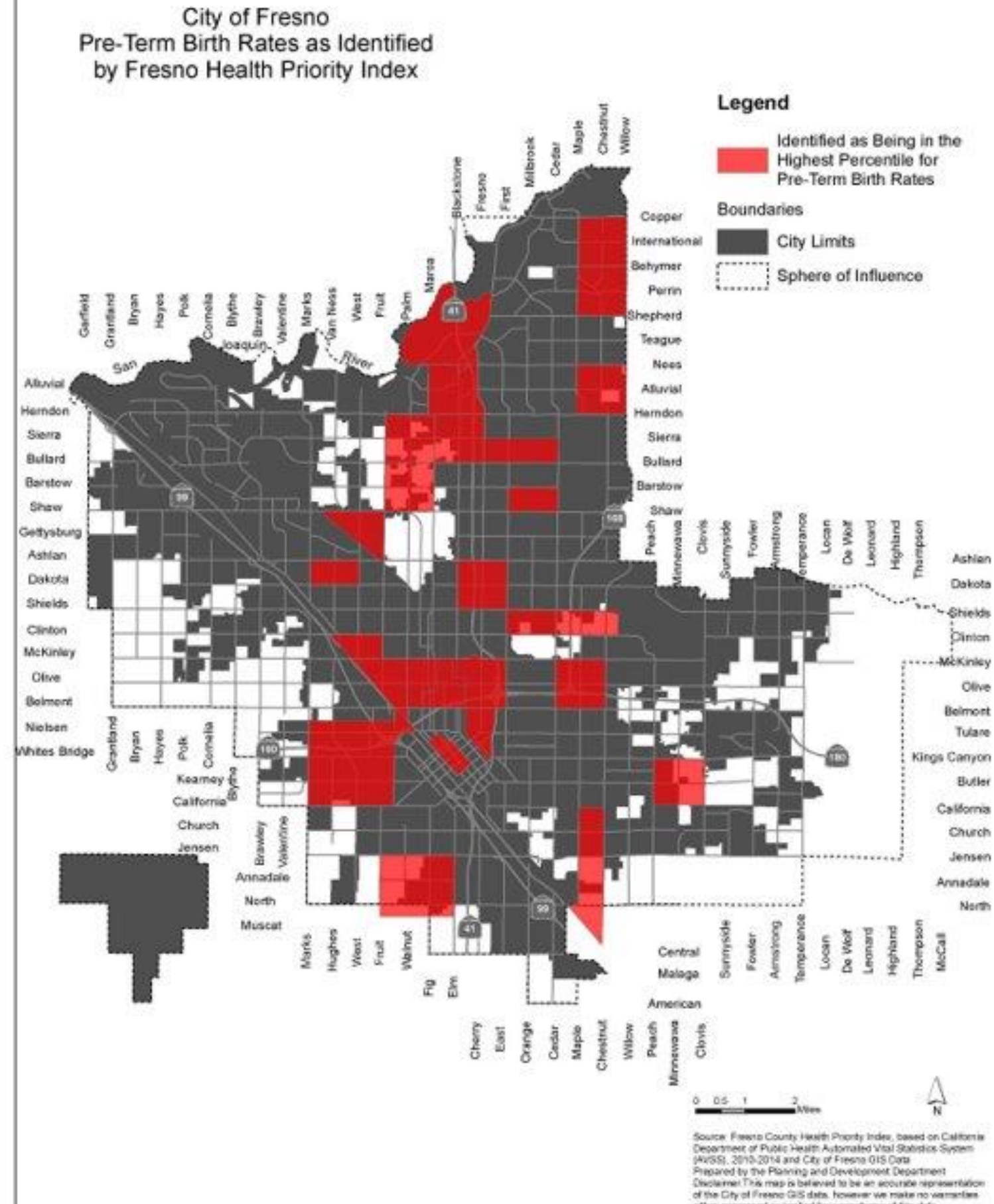

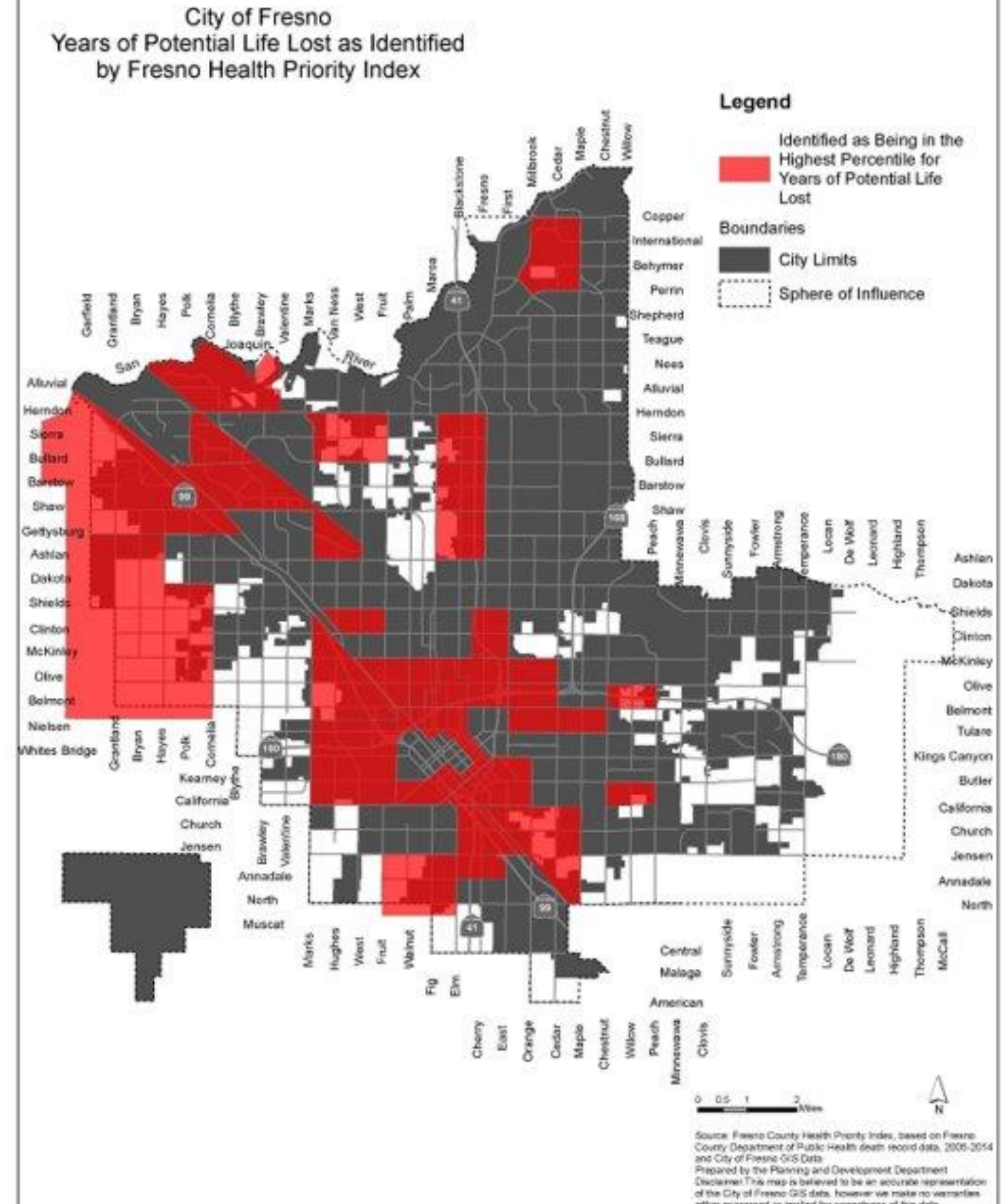

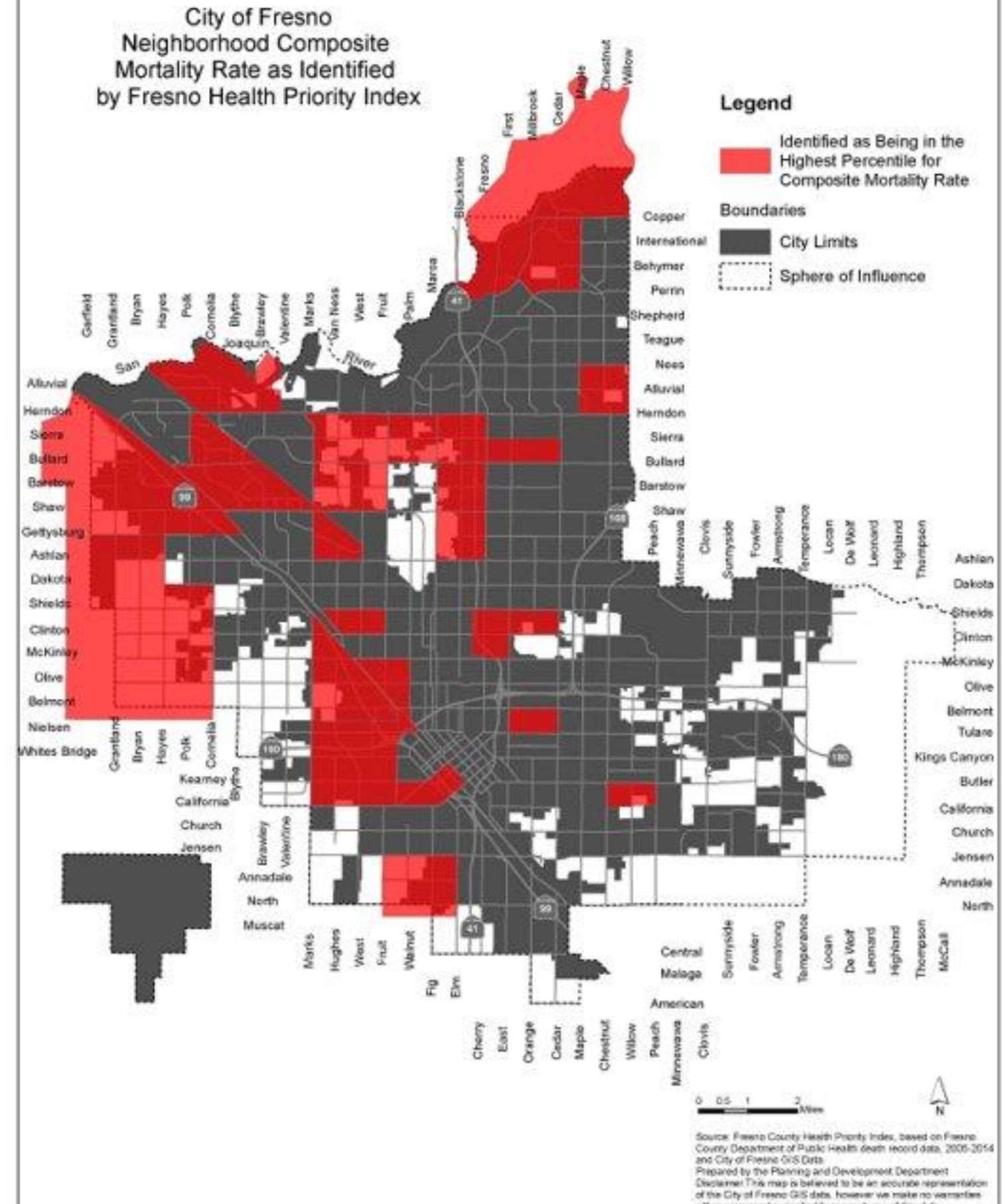

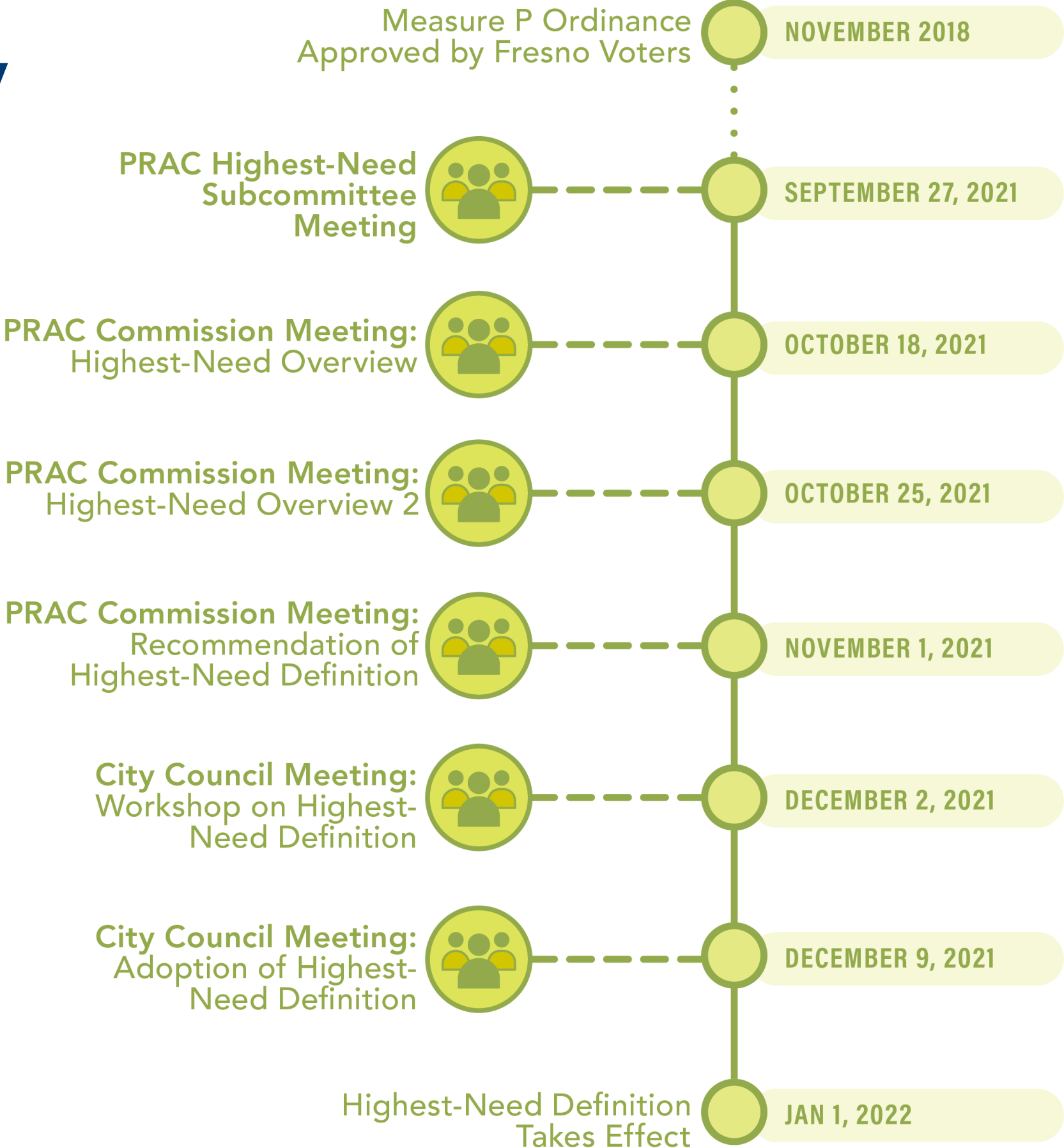

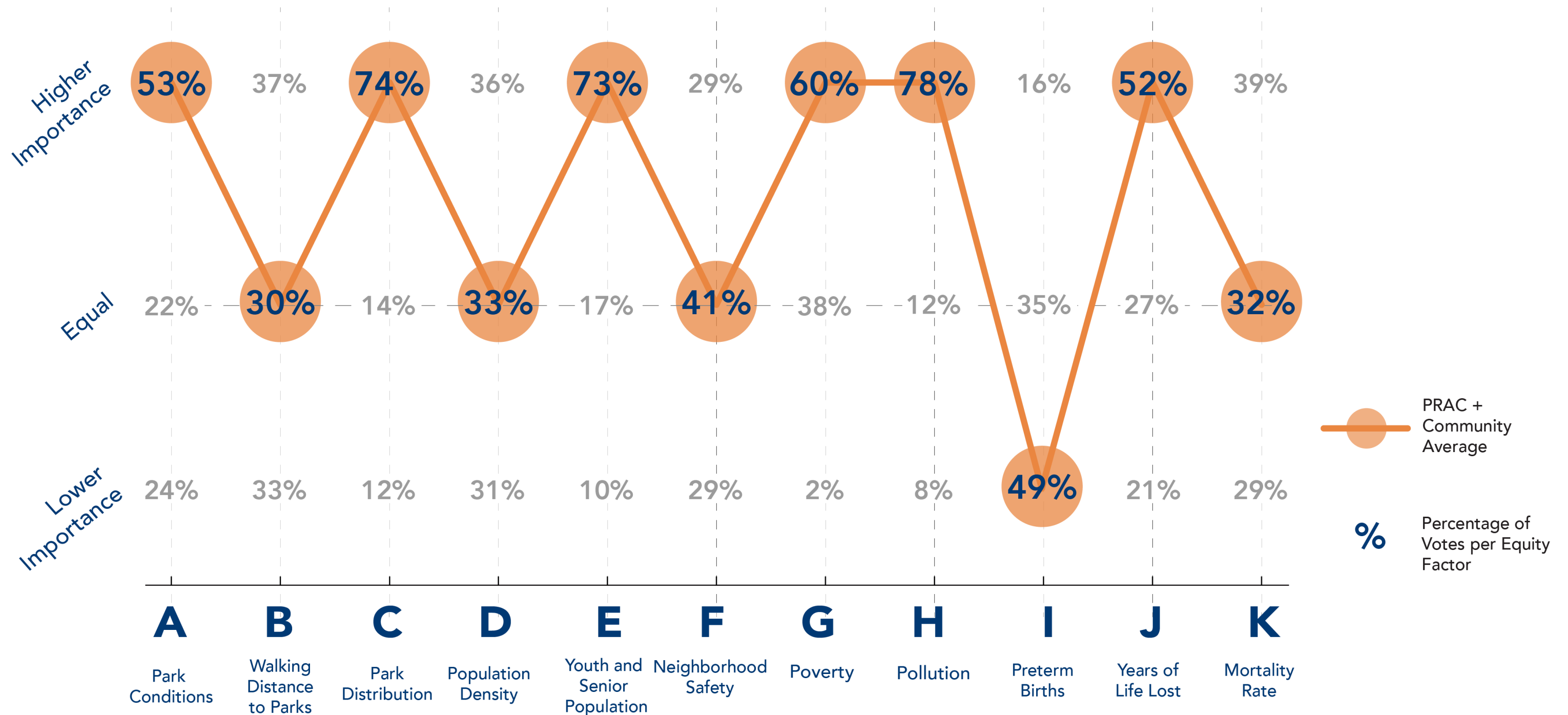

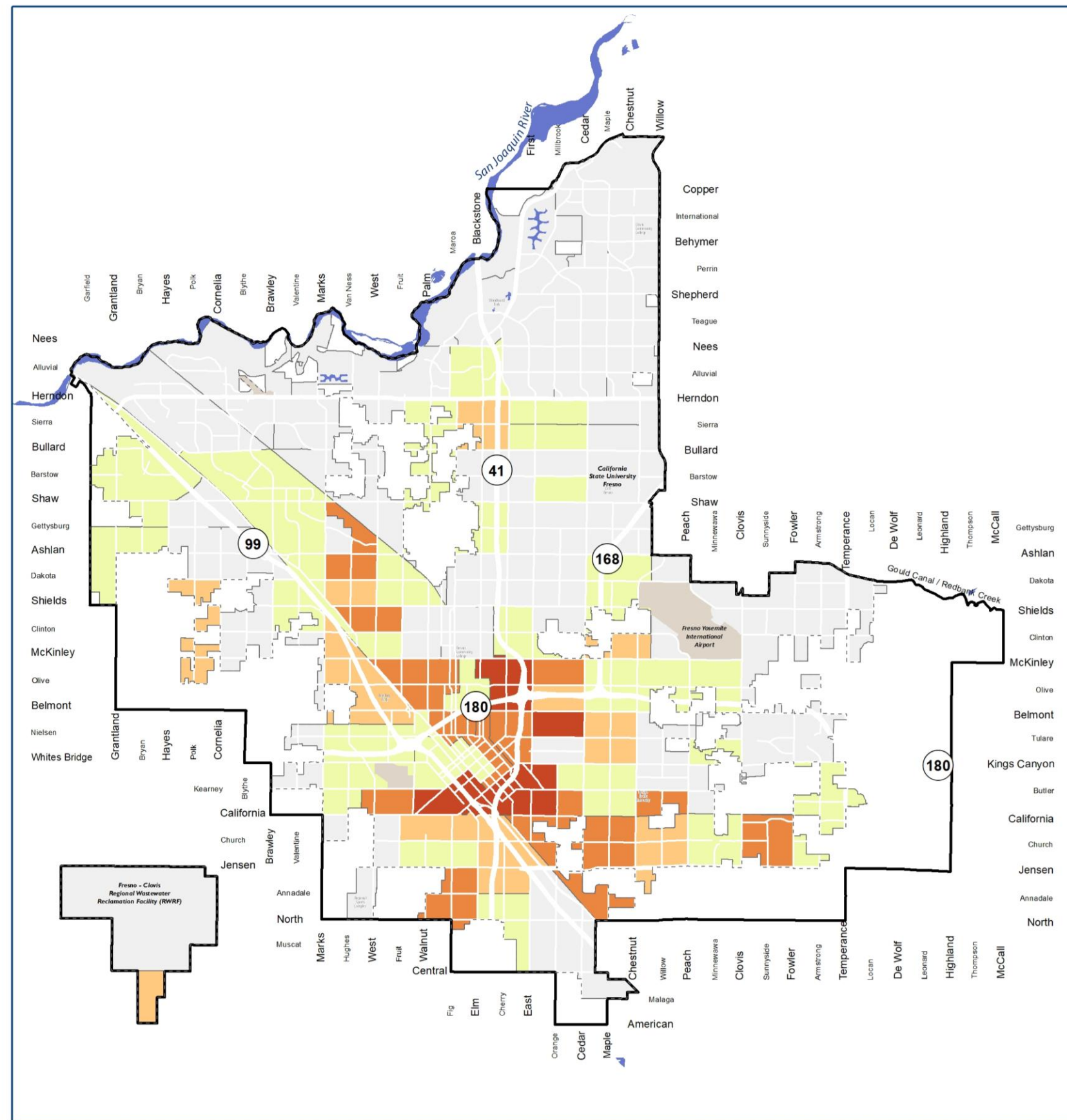

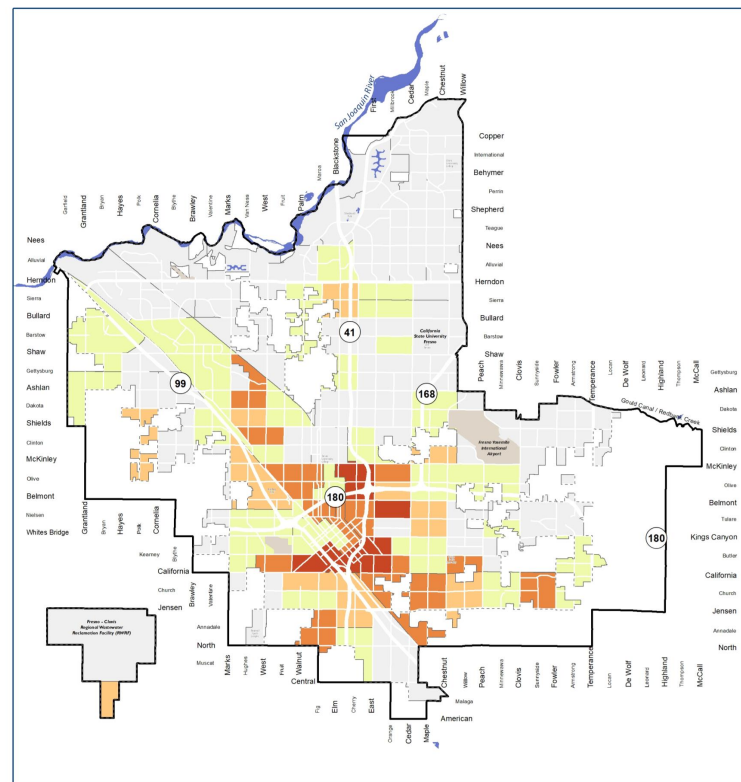



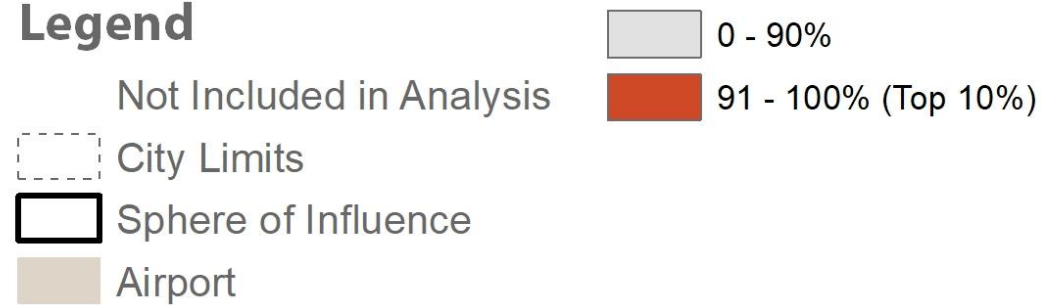

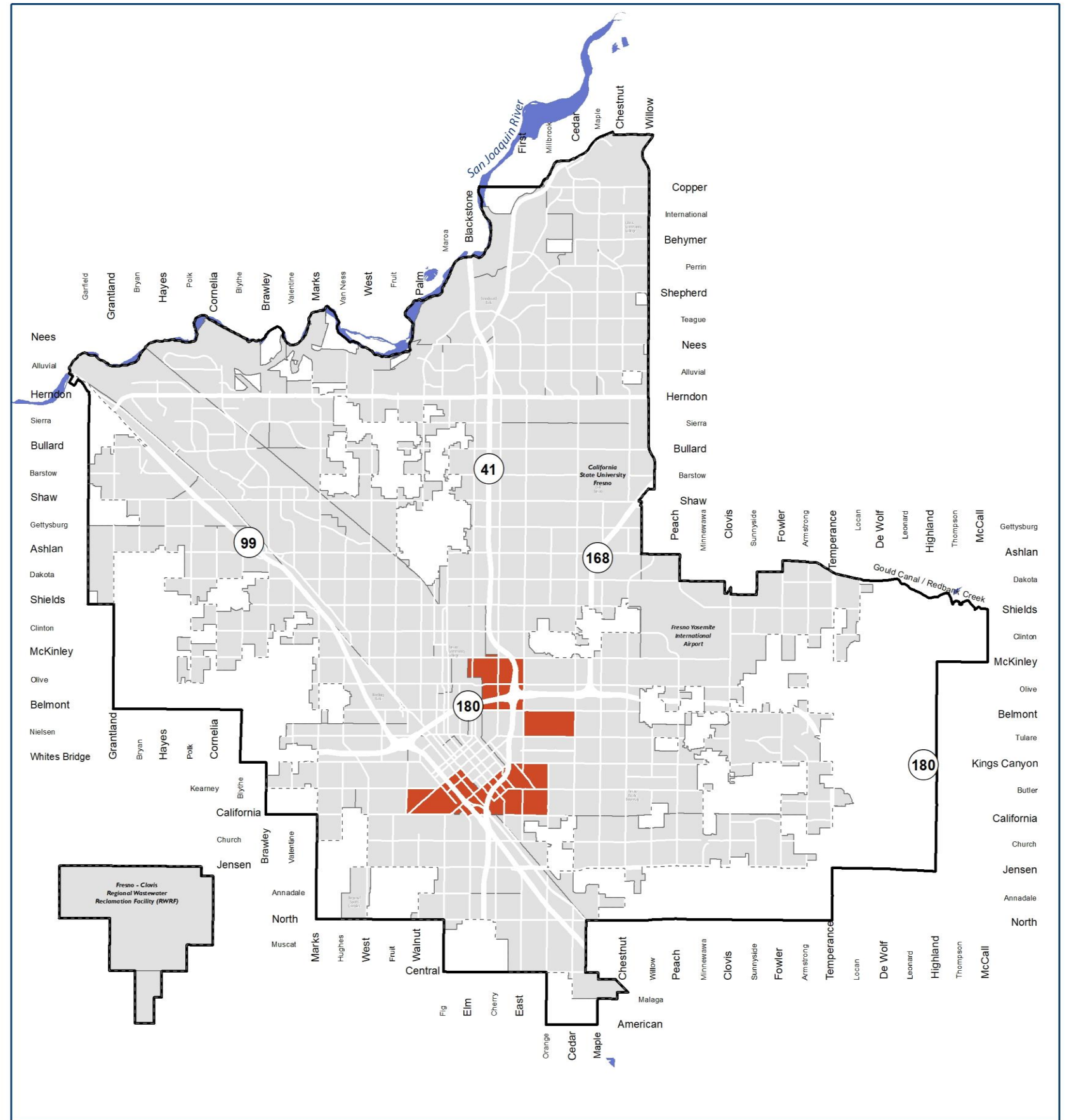

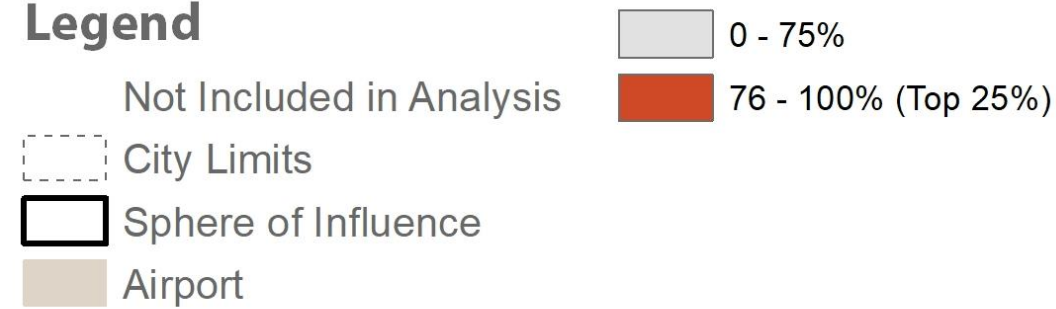

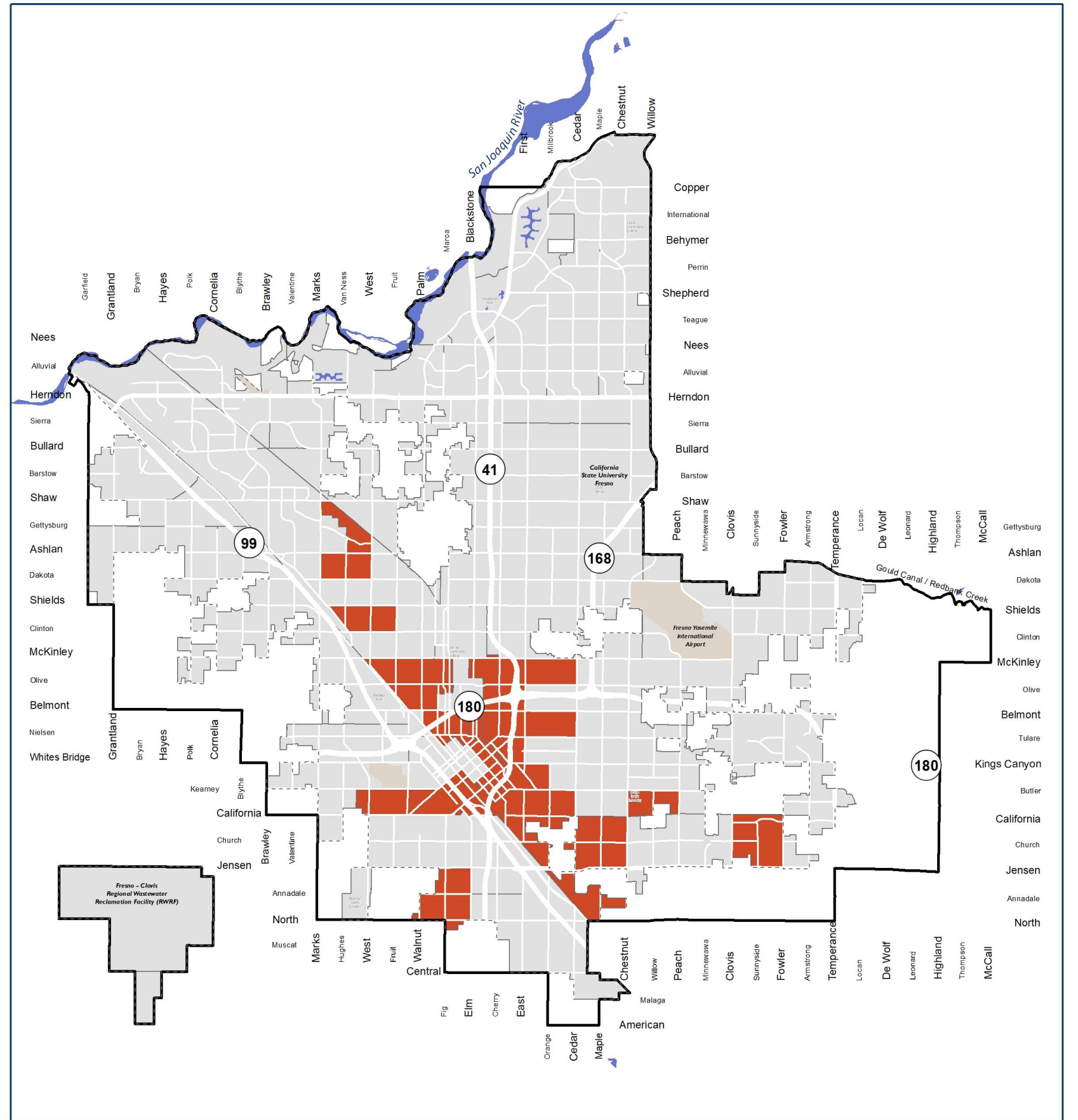

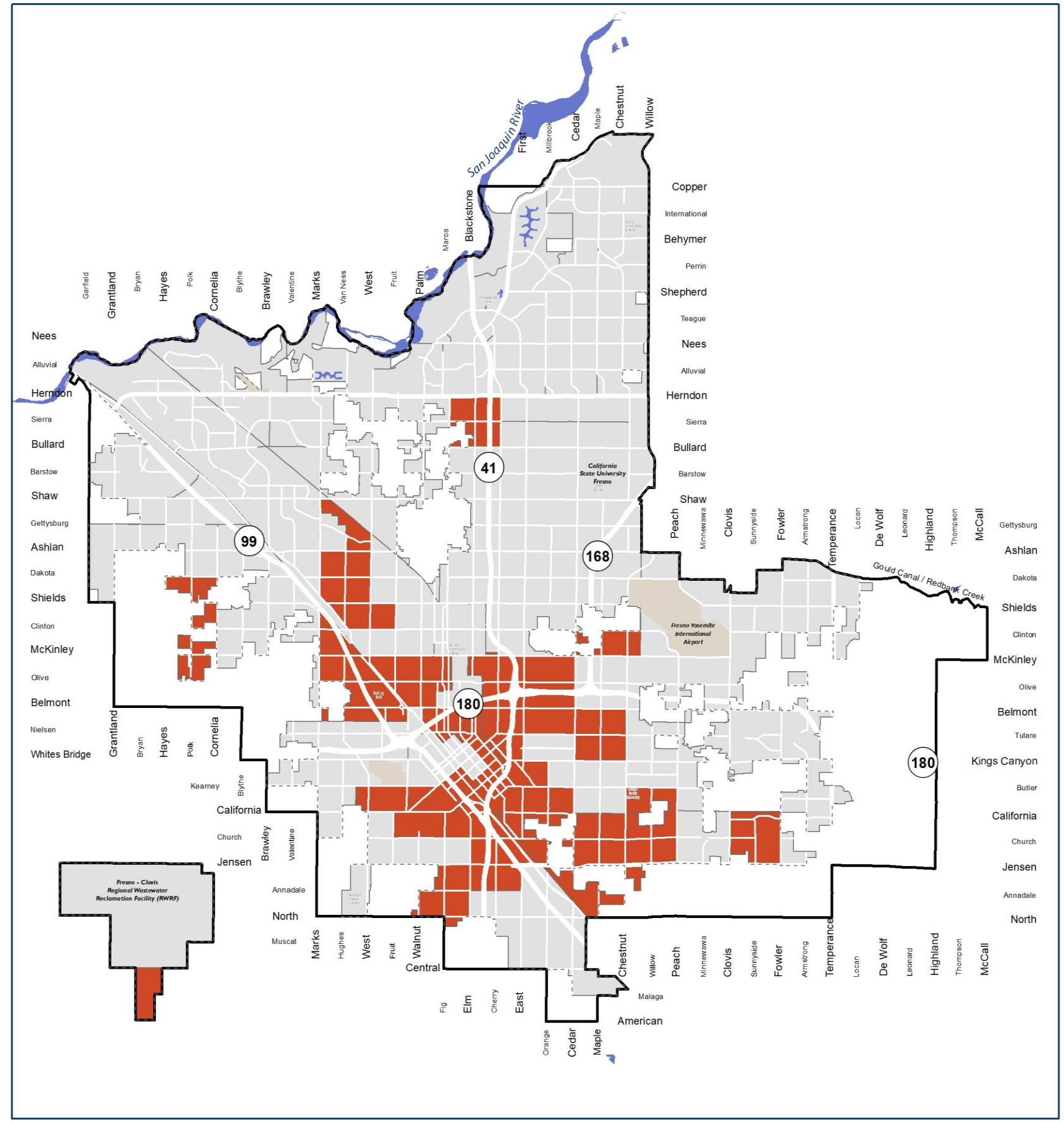

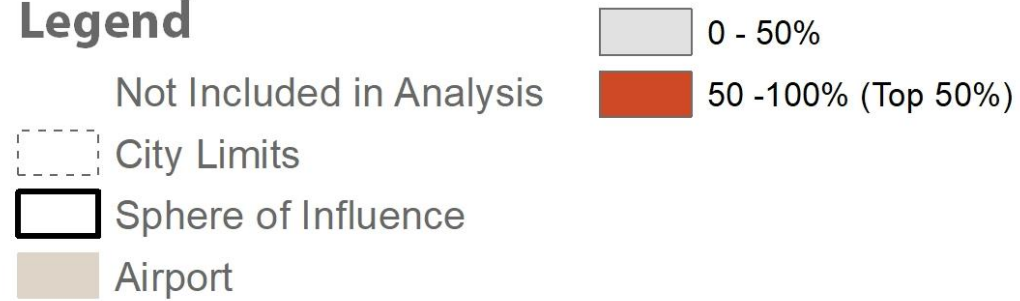

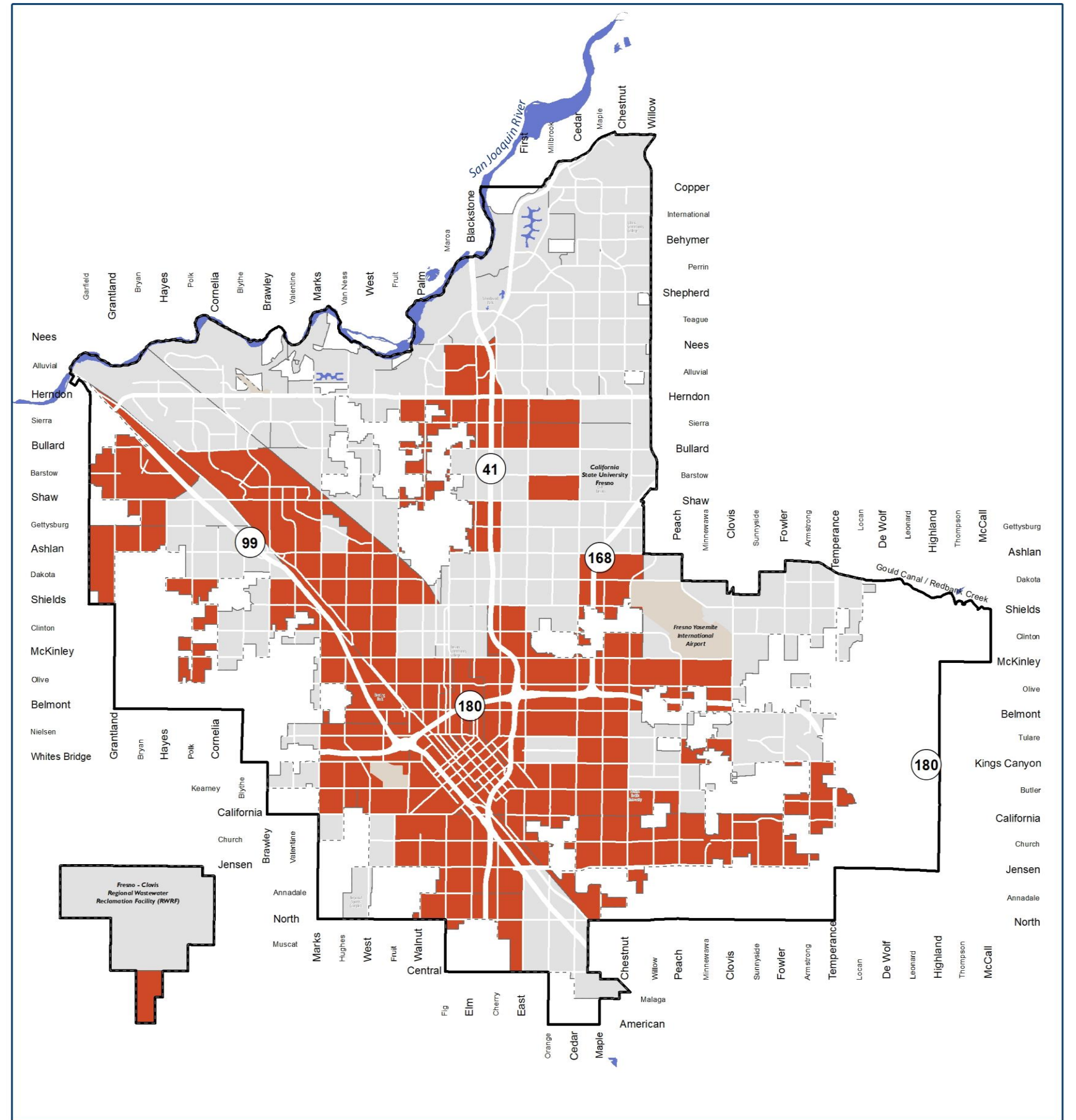

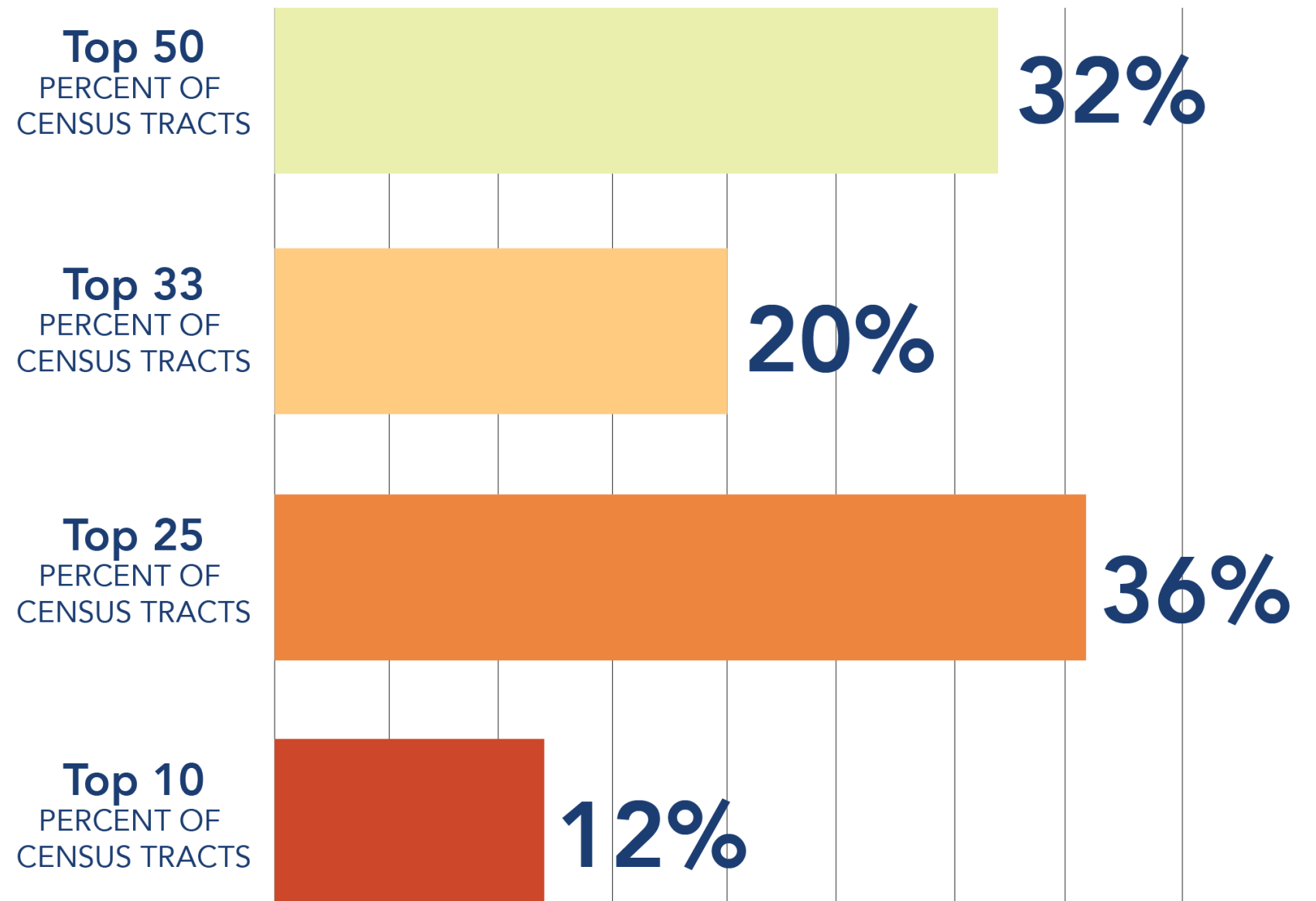

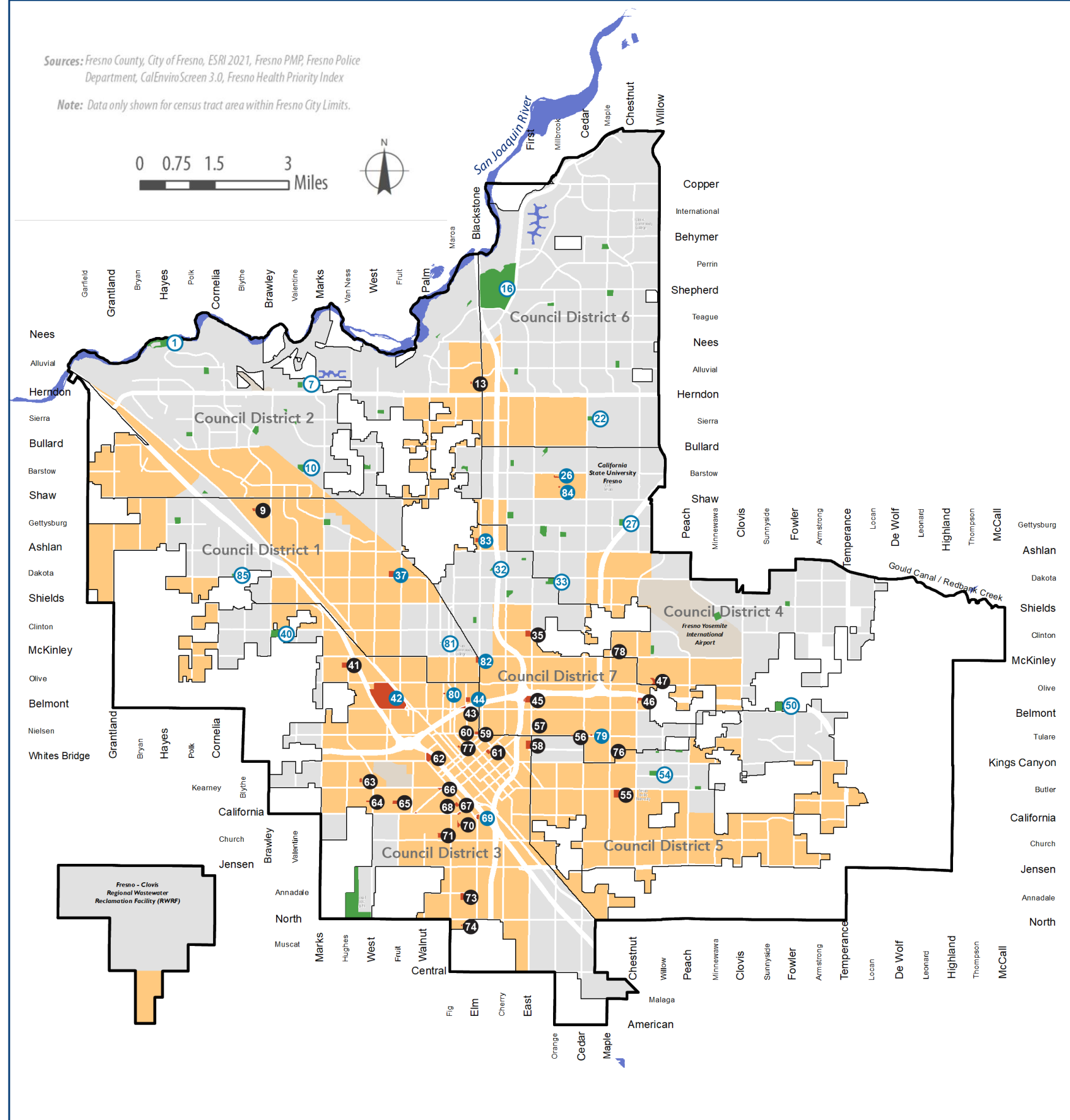
