The program will be led by a dedicated qualified FPD domestic violence lead detective, whose salary will serve as the in-kind match for the program. The detective will be assigned and housed in the FPD Family Justice Bureau and will oversee all tasks performed by the two field domestic violence advocates employed by the Marjaree Mason Center (MMC). They will be responsible for all programmatic coordination, ensure efficient delivery of resources and services available, coordination of cases with victim service providers, and will serve as the Department's liaison with all partner agencies. All statistical data and information for the grant's performance measures will be gathered by the lead DV detective and submitted for the quarterly and annual STOP reports.

Overtime - \$74,695

At times when a domestic violence detective is not on duty, there may be a need to call one out to assist in investigative efforts for successful case prosecution, to place emergency holds on children, and conduct operations to apprehend outstanding domestic violence suspects as quickly as possible to prevent them from re-offending against the victim. Overtime costs will be included for both the Domestic Violence Detectives and Sergeant.

<u>Strangulation Training – Webinar Based</u>

In an effort to ensure the Fresno Police Department (FPD) Domestic Violence Detectives are up-to-date on the latest trainings, FPD will have three Detectives attend a 5-week webinar based training on Strangulation. This training is offered by the Training Institute on Strangulation Prevention. This training will ensure FPD is in compliance with the newly enacted Senate Bill 92. The training will cover the basics of the investigation, documentation, prosecution and advocacy of non-fatal strangulation cases. This training will assist the department in developing an integrated approach to responding to domestic violence, sexual assault and/or child abuse cases who seek to expand their knowledge and training in non-fatal strangulation cases.

Training Costs include:

Registration - \$550.00 for 5-week course X 3 students = \$1,650

Marjaree Mason Center – Victim Services:

MMC, our local domestic violence shelter, will retain two full-time domestic violence victim advocates for the program. MMC will provide qualified and

properly certified victim advocates along with the necessary resource and outreach materials. The victim advocates will be housed in the FPD Family Justice Bureau and will work directly with the patrol officers and domestic violence detective to provide immediate follow-up assistance to domestic violence victims and their children. They will provide crisis intervention, follow-up services, assist victims with legal advocacy, protective orders, court processing, provide victim transportation, and other needed services. The advocates will also assist in domestic violence training for law enforcement personnel. Costs include salary and benefits for each advocate, office supplies, and other items that support law enforcement staff in fulfilling the objectives and activities of the program, and software fees to maintain accurate statistical data for quarterly reporting. In addition, overtime for callouts and after hour incidents for the advocates when needed is also included.

Total Marjaree Mason Center Costs: \$115,312

Program Operating Costs:

These operating costs allow advocates and the lead detective to maintain communication with victims, law enforcement personnel and county prosecutors. Efficiency in the program is promoted by retaining the equipment purchased with prior year funding. Items to be retained during this grant funding

include cell phone service, Warrant Builder, Kahoots and CellHawk software. The cell phone service enhances communication and provides immediate response to advocacy requests. CellHawk software is a web-based mapping and analysis tool that provides the ability to acquire suspect data on phones as they move around town, see how multiple phones are relative to each other, sends a prioritized list of locations of where a suspect's phone is or spends majority of their time and enables the detective to quickly understand who the phone(s) is communicating with. This software provides powerful visual presentations; thereby allowing the DA's Office the ability to present and jurors to understand. Warrant Builder Access is a software program that generates arrest warrant narratives and search warrant narratives, with the most up to date case law language. It reduces the individual detective time of manually typing a warrant from an hour average to twenty minutes to produce a warrant that is ready to be submitted to the courts for authorization from a judge.

Beginning in 2023, the collaborative was assigned to be trainers for our department's Perishable Skills Program, which is required training for all sworn department members from our chief to our newest officer. We respond to the Training Facility one to two times per week to provide POST certified classroom training regarding Domestic Violence for First Responders. A software program

called Kahoots! has an interactive and exciting style of learning that involves setting up multiple choice quizzes and allowing the students to answer questions on their cell phones. The presenter can then show what percentage each response received and discuss the results with the class. The interactive gaming style of training would be a great addition to our current power point presentation, group activity, and video discussion.

Fresno Police Department Domestic Violence Detectives spend the vast majority of their work day at their desks conducting follow up investigations and packaging cases to send to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. Adverse health effects of prolonged sitting begins at only 4 hours, however we are assigned ten hour shifts and some detectives come in early or stay late in an effort to impact more cases. Back problems, high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease and even certain cancers have been linked to prolonged sitting. Although we do take breaks, we try not to make them excessive so we can focus on our work and get our job done. A well-known recommendation to counter-act prolonged sitting is standing while you work. Standing desk converters will allow us to convert our regular desk into a standing desk. This gives us the opportunity to stand up while we read, type,

and even conduct phone interviews, thus mitigating potentially negative health effects and providing an ergonomic workstation to improve efficiency.

In addition to alternating between standing and sitting, ergonomic chairs tend to reduce spinal stress and sitting in a "slumped" position. A properly adjusted ergonomic office chair can increase productivity as it provides comfort and assists with placing the employee at an optimal position for extended hours by reducing the need to re-adjust positions to avoid stiff and sore muscles.

Detectives have many conversations over the phone with our victims. We often call for additional information or clarification of a reported incident, checking to see if additional unreported incidents have occurred, and updating the victim's contact information. Many times, we are called by the victim who is now declining to pursue charges or recanting their original statement. We are issued recorders through our department, but do not have recording adapters made available to us. These adapters plug into our desk phones on one end and into our recording devices on the other, leaving a clear recording of both parties involved in the conversation. Detective can then play back the conversation to document an accurate account of what was discussed, attach the conversation to the police report to be shared with the District Attorney's

We receive a victim's medical records on a DVD from our local hospitals.

Our agency has recently upgraded our computers to laptops and the last computer tower in the Family Justice Bureau has been removed. This left us having to borrow devices to view and/or download victim medical records. It would be a benefit to have DVD Readers available to us for viewing medical records which often include injury photos that can be downloaded and forwarded to the District Attorney's Office.

Problem Statement:

The City of Fresno is the 5th largest city in California with a current population of 542,107 and the boundaries cover 115.18 square miles. The Fresno Police Department's Domestic Violence Unit is currently comprised of nine full-time detectives and two full-time Cal OES grant funded Domestic Violence Victim Advocates.

The City of Fresno has a diverse population with a large percentage being Spanish, Hmong, and Punjabi speaking only. We are fortunate to have an equally diverse unit with our advocates as well as three detectives who speak Spanish, Detectives Ruben Barajas, Michelle Vanzant, and Maria Flores as well as our Hmong speaking detective Lewis Yang and our Punjabi speaking sergeant, Sgt. Sukhbir Chauhan. We also have external sources, including other foreign language speakers within our department, a translation hotline, and an outside agency, Centro La Familia, available to assist with translation. It is the intent of this program to enhance response to all victims of domestic violence and their children in the City of Fresno.

In 2022, the Fresno Police Department (FPD) received 9,788 police reports related to domestic violence crimes and incidents. In 2022, the domestic

violence unit handled 5 domestic violence related attempted homicides and 42

firearm related assault with a deadly weapon cases. To date in 2023, we have handled 6 domestic violence related attempted homicides and 46 firearm related assault with a deadly weapon cases.

The Fresno Police Department has long-standing partnerships with our local domestic violence shelter, the Marjaree Mason Center and with Fresno County Child Protective Services (CPS). These partnerships have provided not only two full-time Cal OES grant funded DV advocates, but one general fund inhouse CPS worker as well. The advocates and CPS worker focus on victims of felony offenses, but also help victims of misdemeanor domestic violence crimes. We have had an Operational Agreement with the Marjaree Mason Center for many years.

Through relationships with victim services agencies such as Rape

Counseling Services of Fresno, and the James Rowland Crime Victim Witness

Center, the collaborative has opportunities to provide victims of domestic

violence and their families many resources including but not limited to

emergency housing, food, clothing, toiletries, counseling, crisis intervention

support groups, and other services. Though all these resources are in place, improvement is still necessary.

Plan:

The Fresno Police Department and the Marjaree Mason Center will continue their long-standing relationship working together toward the mutual goal of providing maximum available assistance for victims of domestic violence in the City of Fresno. The Fresno Police Department agrees to provide one full-time dedicated Domestic Violence Unit detective to serve as both a lead investigator and as a coordinator for the Increased Response to Victims of Domestic Violence Collaborative under this grant funded program. With the guidance of the Family Justice Bureau Lieutenant and the Domestic Violence Unit sergeants, the lead detective will ensure all aspects of the program are being met. They will also serve as a point of contact with the Marjaree Mason Center, while working in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel throughout the life of the grant.

The Fresno Police Department will continue housing the Domestic

Violence Advocates hired with prior year grant funds, in addition to a CPS

worker from Fresno County Child Protective Services, and other members of the

Collaborative, with the goal of providing ever-increasing awareness and assistance to victims of domestic violence.

The Marjaree Mason Center agrees to maintain the two DV advocates hired with prior years grant funding, and they will continue to provide 24-hr response to domestic violence calls for service meeting the criteria set by FPD. Advocates will respond to calls for service involving victims of domestic violence, provide consultation, crisis intervention, referrals, emergency assistance within 24 hours of the request, and will directly aid in the completion of restraining orders for all DV victims and their children targeted by this grant. They will continue to be a resource and provide outreach materials to patrol officers and other relevant FPD personnel. In addition, they will assist FPD DV Detectives with any revisions and/or enhancements to current or newly established protocols. All activities of funded DV advocates will be maintained daily through a time sheet. Training is an essential piece of this program and the DV advocates will assist with the training of patrol officers and other relevant department personnel on the roles and responsibilities of domestic violence advocates when responding to victims of DV and their children. The collaborative team will be responsible for developing, initiating, and maintaining interagency accountability for this program.

One of our current advocate's assigned to the Fresno Police Department has 11 years of experience working with victims of domestic violence and has completed additional domestic violence training, including meeting the requirements of a domestic violence counselor as defined by Evidence Code 1037-1037.7 and an additional 40 hours of domestic violence and/or sexual assault training. Advocates assigned to our department have extensive experience working in the field with victims and their families as they accompany detectives and officers on follow-up investigations, follow up with victims to offer further resources, and provide guidance on both the restraining order process and the court process.

Advocates will maintain a tracking log of all contact with victims targeted under the grant. FPD staff meets monthly to review crime data allowing for ongoing measurement of the Collaborative's effectiveness regarding repeat offenders.

The Collaborative will provide immediate response to DV incidents meeting the required circumstances set forth in FPD Policy 320. This policy is updated as new legal requirements are passed and it guides an officer's response to violations of all types of protective orders to ensure a victim's safety.

Grant funding for overtime will allow the Collaborative members to respond at any time after hours via call-out, advocates to follow up with the family and arrange for safety plans to be put in place, apprehension of wanted suspects who pose a threat to the family, conduct follow up investigations, and refer families to relevant service providers. Timely response, accessibility, and privacy are imperative when providing victim services and this program will allow all involved agencies to provide immediate resources to the victim and their family. With the Collaborative's assistance, DV Advocates will ensure all victims understand their rights and services available to them.

While patrol units make the majority of immediate arrests, exceptionally violent offenders including habitual offenders, known gang members, and offenders using firearms during the commission of their crimes are assigned to Domestic Violence Detectives who then utilize available resources such as FPD tactical teams, parole and probation apprehension teams, and district crime suppression teams as well as tools such as Ramey Warrants, BOLOs (Be On the Look Out flyers), and Ping Warrants to apprehend domestic violence suspects in a timely manner.

The Fresno Police Department has extensive policies and procedures regarding the handling of domestic violence incidents. With previous grant awards, the department incorporated references to the process of issuing and serving protective and restraining orders and reporting procedures to reinforce the fact that resources are available to victims and their children. This grant program will allow us to continue to expand our capabilities as an agency to reach out to all victims and ensure that services are offered to and encouraged for all victims by both first responders and victim advocates.

Earlier this year, our agency released a memo, policy, and a corresponding video with an introduction by Chief Paco Balderrama regarding a lethality assessment being implemented. The assessment is a tool designed to help a victim realize their risk within their intimate relationship and explain they have options and resources available to them. The assessment includes 11 specific questions asked by a first responder to a victim of domestic violence. Based on the answers provided, the victim may be advised they are at high risk of further violence that could include death and are put in immediate contact with a domestic violence victim advocate. Our unit assisted in providing officers with a laminated card containing the 11 questions, the threat admonition, and the hotline number for the Marjaree Mason center to facilitate the delivery of

the assessment. The documentation of this assessment is embedded in our report writing system as well.

Our unit will continue to train department members through our Perishable Skills Program, attend patrol briefings, and present new officer orientation training. We also will continue to speak at group meetings, such as the Fresno Police Department Resident's Academy, Lideres Campesinas, and Clovis Community College. We welcome opportunities to present information on domestic violence prevention, escape, and support services for our community members and hope to expand our reach to additional groups for maximum citizen outreach.

Updated training for patrol officers and other personnel will include the most current POST certified guidelines, legal requirements, and investigative tools as well as the many dynamics of Domestic Violence and children being exposed to violence. This training will also be made available to surrounding agencies.

In conjunction with state law our sworn personnel participate in domestic violence training every two years. An in-depth DV training is currently being presented by members of the collaborative and provided to all sworn officers.

The curriculum includes dual arrests, determining the dominant aggressor, current and new legal mandates to include strangulation and the threat assessments as required by passage and implementation of new California Senate bills among other DV related topics.

The collaborative will provide consultation and resources for officers and other relevant personnel employed by FPD on effective domestic violence interviews, evidence collection, suspect identification, and prosecution.

Bi-annual meetings will remain in place with the Marjaree Mason Center to address and identify areas in which each agency was either at or below the agreed upon accountability measures. Any shortfalls will result in assignment changes to maximize efficiency of the advocacy partnership and policies and procedures set forth.

This cycle of grant funding will further the department's efforts in benefitting the thousands of domestic violence victims as well as their children, along with outreach to those victims who currently do not enlist the services of local law enforcement and victim service providers. By augmenting our current capacities, the Fresno Police Department in partnership with the Marjaree Mason Center, along with continued working relationships with Rape Crisis

Services, Child Protective Services, and the James Rowland Crime Victim

Assistance Center, the Collaborative can make a difference in the lives of these victims, providing education, resources, and counsel as well as training for officers who encounter these victims face to face every day.

With this year of grant funding, we intend to continue focusing our efforts and resources on serving victims and children exposed to domestic violence with the goal of reducing domestic reoccurrence through prosecution and advocacy so cycles of violence can be broken.

By expanding our current capacity in response to victims and their children, we hope to meet that immediate need for each victim. In addition to apprehension and prosecution, the immediacy of crisis response affords our victims many avenues of healing and survival, such as time to seek safe shelter and emotional recovery for themselves and their children. This also allows a greater amount of time away from the abuser and this separation increases the chance of a victim successfully obtaining a restraining order and taking more permanent measures to safeguard themselves and their children.

The immediate safety of all DV victims and offering avenues to successfully break the cycle of violence are fundamental goals of this program.


