75th Anniversary Vision

A celebration that uses 2015 to honor the past, recognize the present, and strategically consider the coming years—through the creation of purposeful tools, events and activities that educate the community, broaden support, acknowledge staff- and inspire action for the future.





History of the Agency

- -United States Housing Act of 1937 provided federal funding to address the shortage of housing for low-income individuals
- In 1938, CA Law authorized jurisdictions to create housing authorities to develop and operate housing and housing programs for low-income families
- -In 1940 the Fresno City Council signed a resolution creating the Housing Authority.
- -The Mayor appoints the seven Commissioners that govern the agency, ratified by the City Council



Structure of the Agency

- The Housing Authority enters into an Annual Contributions Contract (ACC) with the HUD through which it administers programs and receives funding for its major programs
- In 1995, The Housing Authority of Fresno County and the Housing Authority of the City of Fresno entered into an agreement that provides for the two agencies to cooperate for the purposes of making both more efficient and effective
- The two agencies are managed by one CEO/Executive Director, have common staff and systems
- Both Boards of Commissioners act independently but meet jointly for efficiency



What We Do

- Administer Major Housing Programs
- Coordinate Resident Support Services
- Develop, Renovate, and Manage Affordable
 Housing





Who We Serve

- Nearly 16,000 Families
- 50,000 Individuals
- 24,000 Children (ages 0-18)
- 1,900 Seniors
- Race/Ethnicity:
 - Hispanic/Latino: 56.8%
 - Black/African American: 24.7%
 - Asian: 9.3%
 - White: 8.6%
- Average resident annual income: \$10,600
- Single Head Households: 78%



Our Major Programs

- Assisted Housing (HCV/Section 8):
 - Approx. 13,000 total combined vouchers (7,100 City Vouchers)
 - Over 38,000 program participants
- · Veteran, Homeless and Senior Programs:
 - Approx. 300 VASH Vouchers (Veterans)
 - Over 120 units of Permanent Supportive Housing Units
 - 170 Senior Housing units







Our Major Programs

- Affordable Housing
 - 70 Multi-family housing properties
 - Approx. 3,000 dwelling units
 - Over 12,000 residents
 - 200 Farm Labor households
 - 125 Migrant Center units
- Resident Services
 - Education
 - Health and Wellness
 - Wage Progression
