Under Anthony's leadership the Lions have established themselves as the primary benefactor of the Diabetic Youth Foundation's Bearskin Youth Camp. This camp in Sequoia National Forest serves the needs of over 700 children each summer as they learn about and how to live with diabetes. The camp is nearly 50 years old and each year several decks have to be torn down and rebuilt again. The stage platform used for award presentations was so old and unstable that it was declared unsafe and unusable. Under Anthony's leadership and guidance a team of volunteers has spent the last several Memorial Day weekends rebuilding those decks and now the kids have a permanent stage platform that is handicap accessible.

Martinez has traveled every March, at his own expense, to Ensenada, Mexico, with other fellow Lions with the main purpose of re-building schools in the most impoverished communities in Mexico. Martinez was elected as a committee member of Operation Friendship, this project has expanded to include dental hygiene, chiropractic exams and adjustments, blood pressure and diabetes screenings. This leader of many was demonstrating to others that we should actually walk a mile in these disabled children's lives to help us realize their world. That night I saw Anthony bid on the jerseys' that the players were wearing he "won" two of them and the check he wrote was not small, contributing to the \$7,300 dollars that was raised for the Blind Babies Association of Tulare and Kings County that night.

Over the last two years I have spent literally thousands of hours with Anthony as he lead the Lions of District 4-A2. Under Anthony's leadership the Lions of A2 have established themselves as the primary benefactor of the Diabetic Youth Foundations, Bearskin Youth Camp. This camp in Sequoia National Forest serves the needs of over 700 children each summer as they learn about and how to live with diabetes. The camp is nearly 50 years old and each year several decks have to be torn down and rebuilt again. The stage platform used for award presentations was so old and unstable that it was declared unsafe and unusable. Under Anthony's leadership and guidance a team of volunteers has spent the last several Memorial Day weekends rebuilding those decks and now the kids have a permanent stage platform that is handicap accessible. As I went through many pictures of the work being done at this children's camp I saw Anthony in almost all of them.

Operation Friendship is a Lions event each spring where Lions throughout the San Joaquin Valley travel at their own expense to Mexico to assist the building of a school and to provide health and vision screenings. This year Anthony secured many new volunteers to participate in this endeavor. Again, under Anthony's leadership over 600 children and over 200 adults were screened with most of them getting glasses. In one case a 50 year old gentleman brought his 80 year old mother to the screening and she was screened and fitted with the first pair of glasses she had ever had. As she touched her sons face, she sobbed with tears, as she thanked everyone, she said she had not seen her sons face in over 20 years. Hundreds of children will be able to do better in school, thus better in life, because they can now see the blackboard (yes, they still use a blackboard). All of this accomplished with the helping hands and motivation of Anthony.

The Lions Clubs International Foundation is the non-profit foundation that supports humanitarian needs in our community as well as around the world. This foundation supports victims of natural disasters as well as providing needed hearing and vision surgeries for those that can't afford it. Earlier this year Anthony gave a speech in support of this foundation to several hundred people. The emotional challenge to stand with him, and support the many services of this foundation was amazing. After the speech individuals and groups along with clubs started cheering and challenging each other and an hour later nearly \$12,000 dollars was raised to assist others.

OPERATION FRIENDSHIP 2015

The Lions of District 4-A2 joined los Leones del Distrito B-1 in Ensenada, Mexico, March 19-22, for the 53rd annual Operation Friendship Visitation. As most know, this is the annual visit where our Lions make the trek to Ensenada and have traditionally performed eye exams and dental cleanings for the students of a chosen school site. Along with these services, our Lions have also donated cash to the school sites in need of repair, school supplies for the students and teachers and any additional needs identified.

As a Committee member, I am proud to report this visitation had more Lion paws on projects than any time I can remember. What was once eye and dental services only has grown into what was referred to this year as a health clinic. There were Lions performing: vision exams, dental/hygiene services, chiropractic exams, blood pressure checks and glucose testing for diabetes. Also, for any Lions who weren't working at an actual health station, others took care of cleaning the grounds of the school by picking up trash, pulling weeds and trimming trees. This year's school site, Felipa Hirales Elementary School, really benefitted from the services and funds our Lions provided.

I still remember when the time spent at the school was done before noon each year. For the past two years, the Ensenada Lions have had to provide a sack lunch to our Lions because the work and services continue until approximately 3 pm, with the only break being when the students of the morning and afternoon school sessions switch out.

In keeping with true Mexican tradition, there was also fun to be had by all. We were treated to a nice welcome reception on Thursday with dinner and a dance; this year, a mariachi group was also brought in to perform all of our song requests. Friday was the big work day. Saturday was a day of free time with excursion choices for our Lions that included a wine tour and a trip to La Bufadora. I heard compliments from the Lions that chose each option. On Saturday, I went on a nice self-tour of a couple of wineries with the Caruthers Lions, thanks again for inviting Lion Jim, Lion Lydia and I along with you guys...the mushrooms were fantastic (please ask Lion Lydia about that experience).

Others chose to simply relax on Saturday and enjoy the beautiful weather; some spent the day shopping on the local main street, which had much more activity, things to see and open stores than recent years.

Here are some of the final totals: 500 students and 100 adults received Vision exams with 135 pairs of glasses provided, 415 received Dental Hygiene services along with toothpaste and toothbrushes, 140 students and adults received Chiropractic exams with 98 requiring Chiropractic adjustments and 80 students and adults received Blood Pressure and Glucose testing. Money donated to improvements at the school included \$1,300 from pre-sold raffle tickets and \$1,800 from donations from 4-A2 Lions Clubs, Lions and guests. This year, 64 of our Lions took part in the visitation.

Each year, our Committee promises you a great time and that plenty of valuable services will be provided to the students of the chosen school site. This year was no exception; in fact the services provided were over the top. Please mark your calendars for next year's 54th annual Operation Friendship Visitation, March 17-20, 2016.
