Funds will increase the compensation of orchestra members to a more competitive rate and will provide for a marketing professional to assist with outreach, fundraising, and recruitment.

- Employ a part-time administrator and orchestra coordinator, gradually transitioning toward a fully paid administrator
- Expand access for singers by waiving membership fees and music costs
- Enhance marketing and fundraising. This will broaden our outreach, target future audiences, and potential donors
