WORKSHOP ON THE STATUS OF THE CITY OF FRESNO'S RESPONSE TO COVID-19

Without an Emergency Proclamation

The following will no longer apply unless an Administrative Order or Resolution is put in place:

- ➤ Provisions of FMC 2-514 (Response to Covid 19 Emergency)
 - Prohibition on City discontinuance of utility and sanitary services
 - Delay in response to PRA requests
 - Mandate that Senior Hot Meals continue
 - City busses cleaned and disinfected at least daily; modified bus routes allowed
 - Rate freeze on goods and lodging
 - City direction to apply for all available state and federal funding related to emergency
 - Direction to administration to create COVID-19 emergency response fund
 - Curbside alcohol delivery, reverts back to authority under ABC guidelines which currently allow.
 - Mandatory notification by employers who learn of COVID positive employees or customers
 - Fines to businesses that remain open in violation of emergency orders



Without an Emergency Proclamation (2 of 3)

- > Rent deferral, eviction moratorium, and foreclosures:
 - · Expires after our local emergency terminates for residential.
 - However under AB2179 the state has extended to July 1, 2022 for residential tenants who applied for Emergency Rental Assistance for those who have an application and only applies to rental debt between October 1,2021 and April 1, 2022
 - Tenants have up to six months to pay back-due rent accrued during the state of emergency.
 No interest, late fees, or penalties shall accrue. This may be used as a defense in an unlawful detainer action to evict residential tenants
 - Commercial tenants shall not be evicted for nonpayment of rent. Extends 90 days beyond termination of local emergency.
- ➤ Free fare Per resolution, was to continue until City state of emergency lifted by Mayor; however, has already been lifted.
- ➤ Provisions of Emergency Order 2021-02
 - COVID self-screening
 - Employee COVID leave pay
 - Telework policy
 - Limited public access to City Hall
 - Vaccination, mask, and testing requirements



Without an Emergency Proclamation (3 of 3)

- ➤ Policies that continue, so long as a declared California state of emergency is in effect:
 - Brown Act remote meetings provisions under AB 361
 - Requires a declared California state of emergency, and findings every 30 days by
 the Council either that meeting in person continues to directly impact the ability of the
 members to meet safely in person, or that state/local health officials
 recommend/require measures to promote social distancing.
 - Price gouging
 - Moratorium on implementation of City Hall security regulations
 - Rights of the Council and Administration under the Emergency Services Ordinance (see FMC 2-506)



- ➤ EO 2020-15 (Telework by City Employees)










Vaccine Data, Age: 0 - 17 Years






Percentage Of Residents 5+ With At Least One Dose:



Overview


The City of Fresno's Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) began on March 15, 2021 and is available to residents in the City of Fresno that have been negatively impacted by COVID-19 and are unable to pay their full amount of rent and utilities from April 1, 2020 and up to 18 months per household.

The City of Fresno has received nearly \$54,453,991 from the federal and state governments to provide emergency rental assistance grants to improve housing stability in these unprecedented and uncertain economic times. The City is expecting to receive an additional \$12,807,902 in the near future for an overall total of \$67,261,893. The City along with six Community-Benefit Organizations (CBOs) are providing relief to eligible landlords and tenants.

Priority Phases of this program are as follows:

- Priority 1 Rent arrears for applicants below 50% Area Median Income (AMI)
- **Priority 2** Rent arrears for applicants between 50% and 80% AMI
- **Priority 3** Utility arrears
- **Priority 4** Prospective Rent

The following graph indicates our progress as of the date of this report. As we continue to process applications, the obligation and expended gap will close and more City of Fresno tenants will receive rental and utility assistance.
