## MINI-PITCH INSTALLATION SPECIFICATIONS

TO INCREASE ACCESS TO SOCCER IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES, THE U.S. SOCCER FOUNDATION WORKS WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS NATIONWIDE TO OFFER *SOCCER FOR SUCCESS*, A HIGH-QUALITY AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM, AND TO CREATE SAFE PLACES TO PLAY THE GAME.

### THE MINI-PITCH

In communities where space is at a premium, the U.S. Soccer Foundation developed what we call the mini-pitch. These are small, customized hard court spaces perfectly suited for organized soccer programs and pick-up games. Not only do mini-pitches provide quality playing surfaces for children and adults, they also transform the look and feel of neighborhoods. Below, please find information to help your organization target potential spaces for mini-pitch installation.

### MINI-PITCH SITE REQUIREMENTS

- Current concrete/asphalt surface — cannot construct on grass or dirt
- 5,000–7,200 square feet (typically 100–120' long and 50–60' wide)
- Surface is open, flat, acceptable for soccer play and free of major obstructions
- Surface is in a state of good repair, with minimal cracks (1" or less in width) or deviations
- No planned installation on proposed site for a minimum of 6–8 years
- Confirmation that landowner is comfortable with repurposing of space

### MINI-PITCH SITE PREFERENCES

- Targeted mini-pitch space is currently unused or underutilized (common targets are defunct or underutilized tennis/basketball courts, parking lots, or open play spaces)
- Availability for branding/logo placement on mini-pitch surface and potential windscreens
- Potential to host youth development programming, such as the U.S. Soccer Foundation's *Soccer for Success* program
- Accessible to the public for year-round use

**1) \$600,000 to expand the Youth Fee Waiver/Voucher Program to also include youth-serving organizations.**

- FPAU Priority from FY 22-23
- Adopted by Fresno City Council with \$300,000
- Once implemented it excluded a major component which is for organizations and youth-serving businesses to also have access to the funds.

Why invest in these organizations?

- These organizations already have relationships in the neighborhoods they serve.
- Many of these organizations are completely volunteer ran. These funds can help the organizations be self-sustainable and reach more youth.
- The volunteerism performed in these organizations is an unappreciated gem in the city of Fresno. This will both help the organizations and ultimately serve more youth.
- It's being done elsewhere! The County of San Diego implemented this voucher program inclusively as we are asking.

**IT WILL GET MORE KIDS ACTIVE!**

- Many families have financial barriers right now making sports and recreation not a make priority. This program inclusively ran can alleviate families with financial hardships while using city funds to support the well-being of kids.
- Some families with financial hardships have multiple kids!

**2) \$75,000 to conduct an annual Representative Sample Survey**

Ensuring that residents have equitable access to parks, including facilities and programming that fit their specific needs, can have profound positive effects.

Currently, the City of Fresno is conducting a survey on implementing Measure P and distributing its funding. There's no way to control how many times someone can participate or if the participant even lives in Fresno. Through this method, the City of Fresno is getting an unrepresentative and skewed outcome where smaller communities are being overrepresented. This process also leaves room for certain groups or individuals to manipulate the process.

An excellent alternative to a random survey is a representative sample survey. A representative sample is a small number of people who reflect a more extensive group as accurately as possible.

We recommend that this survey is done annually to monitor new trends and any changes associated with Parks, Recreation, and the arts.

#### 3) \$5,000,000 for a city-wide Participatory Budgeting engagement process

Participatory budgeting (PB) is a democratic process in which community members decide how to spend part of a public budget. It puts power into the hands of Fresno residents to decide how their tax dollars are spent. It's a better way to manage public money. Residents' input makes up for any gaps in local leaders' knowledge of the subject matter. This leads to better, more equitable, and innovative solutions while also bringing the people and their government closer together as a community. In the PB process, historically disenfranchised groups are able to participate. Historically marginalized individuals tend to participate more, leading to the government hearing voices of residents who have previously been silenced. To reiterate: the PB process strengthens civic engagement by creating new relationships, empowering new leaders, and strengthening local democracy. This is one of the recommendations from the 2020 Commission on Police Reform. Recommendation #36 to be exact. We see this enacted as a solution to the struggle to have residents participate in government. Including the Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission.

We encourage the Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission to send a recommendation to the City of Fresno to incorporate a city-wide participatory budgeting process that can include parks, recreation, and the arts but is not exclusive to.

#### Safe Places to Play - National Initiative

In communities where space is at a premium, the U.S. Soccer Foundation developed what they call the mini-pitch. These are small, customized hard court spaces perfectly suited for organized soccer programs and pick-up games. Not only do mini-pitches provide quality playing surfaces for children and adults, but they also transform the look and feel of neighborhoods.

#### **Impact Nationwide:**

- ❖ **Increasing Access**
  - 96% say their mini-pitch is accessible to all
  - 90% of mini-pitches are located 30 minutes or less from users
  - 31% of mini-pitch users are new to soccer on average.
  - 69% of users are eligible for free and reduced-priced meals
- ❖ **Providing More Opportunities to Play**
  - 5x more soccer is played at the sites after the installation of mini-pitch
  - 4: the average number of hours programming is running per day on each court
  - 3: Daily additional hours of play made possible by mini-pitch lighting
- ❖ **Strengthening Communities**
  - 99% say people in their communities say their communities are more active after the installation of a mini-pitch (court).
  - 98% say their community feels safer after the installation of mini-pitch
  - 91% say their mini-pitch serves as a community hub

  - [Data for Social Good](#) (DSG) was commissioned by The Fresno County Civic Engagement Table (FCCET), a coalition of local organizations to conduct a survey within the City of Fresno. The research was conducted from June 25 to August 23, 2022. A total of 1,850 Fresno residents were contacted via phone by coalition members. DSG oversampled Latinos, Blacks, and Asians to approximate the City's registered voters and has a 2+/- margin of error. This is the third iteration of Fresno Speaks conducted in 2020, 2021, and now 2022.
    - **The city of Fresno approved Measure P to tax retail transactions. The City projects being able to dedicate almost \$75 million to improve & maintain parks and facilities create new parks and trails, and fund recreation, community, and arts programs.   - The Masterplan concludes that Soccer is the most on-demand activity locally with participation ranging from 11 to 34% higher than the national average for soccer participation.
    - **25%** higher participation than the national average in the city as a whole for **soccer**.
    - **5%** higher participation than the national average in the city as a whole for **volleyball**.
    - **5%** higher participation than the national average in the city as a whole for **basketball**.
