



Notes

- FY 2024 General Fund appropriations are decreasing by \$1,248,200 due to the reallocation of the Budget Division to the new Budget and Management Studies Department.
- Cannabis Equity Grant funding will be fully expended in FY 2023 representing a decrease of \$1,050,000 in FY 2024.
- A total of \$600,000 budgeted in FY 2023 to complete construction of the Animal Center is not budgeted in FY 2024.
