

Prop. 218 Schedule



- Nov. 20, 2014 Council authorized Prop. 218
- Dec. 22, 2014 Completed mailing of Prop. 218 notices
- Feb. 5, 2015 Public hearing
- Feb. 26, 2015 Council to consider rate approval
- March 30, 2015 Approved
 rates become effective





Prop. 218 Public Notice Process



- Based on California Constitution and Settlement Agreement
- 213,581 public notices/protest ballots mailed to property owners and ratepayers
- Printed on transmittal envelope:
 - Clear notification regarding content
 - Recipient's name
 - Assessor's Parcel Number (APN)
 - Affected property location ID
 - Recipient's street address



Prop. 218 Public Notice Process



- Transmittal envelope included:
 - Prepaid-postage return envelope
 - Protest ballot printed in English, Spanish and Hmong
- Four page Public Notice as required by California Constitution for Prop. 218 process:
 - Basis of calculation for 5 year rate plan
 - Reasons for proposed rate changes
 - Instructions for protesting proposed rate increase
 - Also available online in English, Spanish and Hmong



Prop. 218 Mailing List/Ballot Counting

Mailing list:

- Utility Billing Database + Parcel Database
- Final mailing list count = 213,581
 - Owners of affected parcels = 133,347
 - Differences between billing and parcel databases (renters, duplicate names) = 80,300
- Ballot counting:
 - USPS, City Clerk (time stamped), Presort Center (sorted/scanned/counted); City Clerk validates
 - 66,674 valid ballots required for successful protest



Maximizing Awareness of Prop. 218



- Education efforts conducted in English, Spanish, and Hmong:
 - TV (42 spots on KFTV)
 - Radio (60 spots in Hmong, 201 in Spanish, and 441 in English)
 - Print (2 half-page advertisements in *Fresno Bee*)
 - Media Coverage (broad coverage in print, radio and television/English and Spanish)
 - Two advertisements on Fresno Bee website
 - 212 calls to Prop 218 Hotline (English and Spanish)



Maximizing Awareness of Prop. 218



- City of Fresno website:
 - 712 views on Prop. 218 webpage; 165 in Spanish and 46 in Hmong
- Recharge Fresno website:
 - 2,323 page views
- Prop. 218 reminder inserts in utility bill:
 - 133,347 mailed in December/January in English, Spanish and Hmong
- Various community presentations/briefings



What We Heard During Public Notice Period

- Water affordability and equity are important.
- New development should pay its fair share of program costs.
- What happens if we don't advance the capital plan and rate plan (What is Plan B)?
- The City has credibility issues (delivery of projects, transparency, compliance with adopted plans).
- What is the reliability of the City's surface water entitlements?
- Are there any restrictions on water we receive from Millerton Lake and Pine Flat Dam?
- What happens if we get additional financial support from the State of California?
 - Are we certain that the Recharge Fresno plan will meet the State's requirements in the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act?



Summary



 Compliance with stipulations of Settlement Agreement, above and beyond requirements of California Constitution (Prop. 218)

- Highly visible, multilingual notifications and information access
- Broad reach to all Fresno property owners and ratepayers



Next Steps



- Work with the SWRCB & DFA to determine State funding to be awarded
- Update financial model to reflect anticipated additional State funding
- Present final recommended rate plan for consideration and adoption, incorporating any additional State funding
- Consider, adopt and implement rate plan
- Finalize Water Affordability Credit Program
