The Asian Business Institute and Resource Center (ABIRC) has been serving our small Southeast Asian (SEA) farmers since the COVID-19 pandemic. We have witnessed the negative impact of this disease in our entire community, especially our most socially challenged and hard to reach communities. The majority of the small SEA farmers are monolingual, have low literacy, are not tech savvy, experience cultural and language barriers, and have limited financial resources. In addition, many of the emergency service providers in the community do not have the capacity or the bandwidth to serve our small SEA farmers. Because of these and other complex issues, notice of the initial emergency relief resources never reached these constituents.



Dear Fresno City Council and Mayor Brand,

Small-scale, minority-operated family farms in Fresno County are suffering from the economic impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic. Many of these farms have lost sales due to restaurant closures and reduced sales at farmers markets and other venues where they sell their produce. These include many Southeast Asian farms that sell specialty produce at farmers markets, roadside stands, and to wholesale restaurant suppliers. While several programs for receiving and distributing unsold produce from farms during the pandemic have been created, these programs are not accessible to very small-scale farms that rely primarily on direct marketing to consumers. An alternative is needed to keep these farms in business during the current crisis that has disrupted their usual markets. For example, a small grants program to partially compensate farmers for donating unsold produce to food banks would assist small-scale family farms while also providing culturally relevant specialty produce to food-insecure communities and vulnerable populations.

As the Small Farms and Specialty Crops Advisor with the University of California Cooperative Extension in Fresno County, I and my program staff are in contact with small-scale farmers who are experiencing these losses in sales. We commit to assisting farmers to accessing any assistance programs that the City of Fresno might support, and to advertising them on our weekly radio show in Hmong.
