




What did the community see?

- 3 themes emerged to address street violence
 - 1. Supportive Services
 - 2. Mentoring
 - 3. Safe Havens



Initial Ideas & Recommendations

- "Safe Space" buildings for training, mentoring, trauma-informed care, and recreation - Not just "hang out spots"
- Youth jobs and summer jobs (hire youth to clean up and oversee parks program in general)
- Trips to universities and other educational exposures
- Stipends for training to become mentors



Initial Ideas & Recommendations (cont.)

- Bringing rivals together
- Counselors or "Community Safety Monitors" for personal trauma (after loss/violence in school) instead of School Resources Officers (SRO's)
- Child care support
- Sports programs
- Public transportation, including free FAX for students/youth
